from Marblehead Grid Togs

Marblehead Football Minstrels Busy Preparing Attractions for Road Trip

Coach McGuinness to Feature Dick Wells,
Harry Glover and Fred Jermyn on Journey to
Miami, Fla., and Possibly Mexico City

Marblehead's meandering football minstrels are busy these days preparing a new and varied list of attractions for the education of the natives from the orange groves of Florida to the cactus clumps of Mexico. Director Charles McGuinness this year will feature Dick Wells, his "Phi Beta Kappa" quarterback, who, as a freshman and sophomore, set a scholastic precedent by gaining a place on the high honor roll; Harry "Mit" Glover, a regular halfback who contributes to the support of a family suddenly deprived of its chief provider, and Fred Jermyn, a startling fullback who strengthens his finger muscles by milking eight cows every morning and night.

TRIP TO MIAMI WINS APPROVAL

The hustling Headers, whose perambulatory proclivities have brought solemn head-shakes from their more conservative brethren, are planning a wide-open, hair-raising triple wing back attack to carry with them into foreign lands after the leading elevens on the North Shore have had an advance showing of the new act.

The trip to Miami for a game on Dec. 8 already has been approved by the school board, while the added junket to Mexico City will be discussed and voted upon Monday night. Even then, McGuinness must regretfully refuse two very tempting offers to show his all-star attraction in Wisconsin and Illinois, for he could not possibly make arrangements to accept the invitations, one from St. John's Academy at Delafield, Wis., for a game in Northwestern's huge stadium and the other from Proviso High of Maywood, Ill., to dedicate a new field.

The Marblehead boys are growing accustomed to traveling, for the football team has been to Illinois before; the basketball squad toured New York state last winter; and the baseball team made a playing jaunt through Washington and nearby cities this spring.

Since the journeys do not cost the school or town anything, no objections could be based on financial pleas. The headmaster, George P. Campbell, and the chairman of the school board, Dr. Samuel C. Eveleth, who also has served as team physician for some 20 years, accompany the boys to help McGuinness with his general duties, so they are not lacking in supervision.

BOYS MUST STUDY TWO HOURS A DAY

Finally, if the squad is allowed to go to Mexico, school work will not suffer, for every boy will be required to study two hours every morning and to take a one-hour examination in each of his subjects once a week. That arrangement should be satisfactory to every one.

The trip to Miami for a game on tinct novelty, for no international school game, so far as is known, ever has been played. The school received an invitation from the Mexican national government to extend the Florida trip to Mexico City, where a game would be played with the Escuela Preparatorio Nacional. The government has agreed to pay for the transportation of the squad to and from Mexico and to provide suitable living accommodations and entertainment while the boys are in the country.

The boys are banking on the school committee next week, for they are fighting for places on the team with that prospective trip as one of the objectives. The board has been very fair in the past and whatever the decision is, it will have been reached only after very judicious discussion.

There is no question but what the boys really are battling for the team. The frequent scrimmages reveal the struggles going on, and the feeling runs high as it could in a real game. Every block is tooth-jarring, every tackle is bending.

Jermyn, the modern farmer boy, is an example. Freddy has been milking cows so long that his fingers and wrists are developed to such an extent that he frequently amuses his team mates with exhibitions of strength. But that strength is directly responsible for his method of carrying the ball. He refuses to adopt the orthodox, under-arm lugging, preferring to grip the pigskin with one hand, a la Danny Wells, Harvard's quarterback last year.

That was the way Jermyn worked last week in the scrimmage on his second day out. He used his free arm to great advantage, throwing prospective tacklers off stride with ease, twisting and squirming forward all the while. He is the only newcomer to the backfield and he is likely to prove the star of the season.

Wells is truly brilliant. In his freshman year, he was the only boy in his class to make the highest group of the honor roll. He repeated that stunt last year as a sophomore. In addition, he found time to play football and baseball and gain the reputation of being the best tennis player in the school.

His father was captain of the Dartmouth hockey team in 1912, being recognized as one of the best ice men the big green has had. Young Dick is pointing for Hanover, but he has another year of competition, with a captaincy in either baseball or football as a likely reward for his services.

LARKIN IN CHARGE OF OTHER END POST

Vin Larkin, promising sophomore, is in charge of the other end post at present and is doing well. He pitches for the Legion team. Jim Lennox, 175 pounds of fight, has been shifted from end to one of the tackle berths with Albert "Pete" Stone holding down the other.

Stone is the younger brother of Tubba, the hero of Bales's great stand against Yale in the bowl last year. Tubba was marvelous at the 'Head and has been helping McGuinness with the line for the past few weeks, prior to returning to Waterville for his senior year.

Speaking of Stone's success in college brings to mind the fact that Marblehead, despite its small enrollment, has contributed generously to college teams. Trim Roberts and Chet Meservy are at Temple with Pop Warner, for whom McGuinness scouts. Then there is Roy Winslow, star end at Springfield; Irving Tutt is doing well at University of Florida, and Norris Harris is at Clemson.

To get back to the team, the present guards will have their hands full keeping their positions. Len Magee, a junior, is in the left-hand spot at present, with Ed Phelan, place-kicker extraordinary, on the other side. Last year, Phelan was a one-play man, going in to kick points after touchdown, but he is out to win a regular, all-around job this season. His 185 pounds will help him.

Elliot Roundy, another baseball player, is at center. Roundy moves over to guard on defense when Cudihy moves back out of the line, and last year he could play either center or guard, as can Webster Day, his substitute. Day, too, is a pitcher on the high school team.

It may be "veni, vidi, vici" at Marblehead if Martin "Iggy" Drennan can translate that Latin quotation and others similar. Iggy is just about the fightingest boy on the squad and able to play any position. Last year he was the regular fullback. The other day he played a slashing game at end in the scrimmage. And he can fill in at guard if the boys at those posts don't come up to expectations.

There is a "but" attached to Iggy, however, for he took a make-up exam in Latin I last Tuesday, and his success in that test will determine his eligibility. McGuinness, of course, is hoping that he came across like Caesar over the Rubicon.

Bill Loveday is another good backfield prospect. He plays second base for the Industrials as well as for the high school nine and has the makings of a good football player, for he can run well and does a bang-up job calling signals. His blocking and tackling are weak, however, and he must improve in those departments before he will be in line for a regular post. He has the spirit to rectify his mistakes, however.

There are other good boys on the club. Dick Connors, right in the fight for a guard berth, was just declared eligible. Walter Fader, the fastest man on the squad, is a good back, while Al Gagnon also may fit into the line some place.

BOYS' EQUIPMENT IS OF THE BEST

One thing very noticeable at Marblehead is the equipment. It is a comparatively small school, but the ranking 26 boys on the squad have two complete uniforms, one for practice and one for games. They have the best of pads and protective devices.

The first squad plays a full list of games, but football in the school does not stop there, for the seconds have a 10-game schedule which they play on Mondays, with Peabody, Swampscott, Beverly, Wintthrop and similar schools on the list and the lightweights play eight games on successive Fridays.

Even the supporters at Marblehead will get a break this year, for the ERA administration, in conjunction with the town, is adding 2500 seats to the bleacher capacity of Joel W. Reynolds playground on Green street, where the games are played. The field is open, but the team makes money with its heavy schedule.

It used to be "Remember the Maine" for years after 1898, but at Marblehead for years to come, it probably will be "Remember the trip to Mexico."

WELLS OUTSTANDING AS QUARTERBACK

The boy is short and powerful, packing 155 pounds and carrying them well. He can run very effectively, passes extremely well and on occasion, he can be relied upon to kick. His natural intelligence and football sense make him an outstanding quarterback.

Glover started playing in the backfield when he was a freshman and still is there in this, his senior year. Last month, his father died very suddenly, a victim of sun stroke, and Harry immediately found a job pumping oil. He works 30 hours a week and turns in enough money to his mother to cover most of the expenses, but that has not interrupted his school or football work.

Those three are the headline performers in this year's array, but there are others who will play prominent parts in the action drama. Dick Messenger, an all-around junior, played a slashing game at full-back last year but he has been shifted to half-back this fall to take the place of Lindsay Brackett, who was the 1933 backfield star. The fact that McGuinness deems him a worthy successor to Brackett would indicate in just what esteem Dick is held.

Then young Madison Putnam will have his own little audience. Maddy, out for football for the first time, is known all over the North Shore for his catching ability. He is only 15 years old but he has played for Marblehead Legion for the past two seasons, leading that club in hitting with an average of .370 this summer. He was regular catcher in high school as a freshman last spring and will be able to play three more years.

Last year Putnam played for the Industrials of Lynn in the semi-pro

championships in that city. His teammates were almost 10 years older than he, but he was outstanding. He is comparatively small, weighing slightly more than 150, but he may do things in football.

The Marblehead line will be formidable, averaging around 175 pounds, which is fairly heavy for a high school team. The average is boosted by Right End Johnny Cudihy, 185-pound senior, who has starred in all sports for three years. His basketball training makes him a great pass receiver and he is so good on defence that he has been shifted to back up the line when the other team has the ball.

ALUMNI LOST

Holding the strong Swampscott Town team to a 6 to 6 tie until the final minutes of the game, Marblehead High alumni were unable to stem the final period surge of the Sculpins and succumbed 19 to 6 Saturday afternoon at the Joel Reynolds arena in a benefit tilt which netted \$37 to the "On to Miami" war chest.

Without any previous practice, the 'Head stars put up a great struggle for three cantos. Herbert Steele, knotting the count in the second stanza, after Jim Wallis had placed his team in the van by a first period touchdown.

Swampscott's first score was aided by a penalty, the Sculpins being awarded the pigskin on Marblehead's 15-yard chalk line, where it rolled offside from Anderson's punt. Referee Jim Marks gave the ball to the Sculpins, at this point, claiming Chaisson had been clipped coming down field, and Wallis crashed the line for the count.

Marblehead's only score resulted from the stellar ball totting of Phil Wade, Steele and Pontollo, aided by some excellent cleaning out by Jack Winchester and Bucky Taylor.

In the waning moments of the closing chapter, Wallis ripped through the Marblehead line for the score after the Sculpins had accepted a punt on the 'Headers five yard mark. Ty Anderson's 35-yard pass to Gill accounted for the final score, the Sculpin appearing from a crowd of spectators on the sidelines to clutch the ball and scamper for the score. Marblehead Team Leaves for Miami; To Meet Edison High Eleven, Dec. 8

The crack Marblehead High football squad, 26 players strong, and some hundred followers from the Yachting Capital shoved off aboard the Eastern S. S. Acadia from Indian wharf yesterday at 5 P. M. bound for Miami where the 'Headers will meet Edison High of Miami Dec. 8.

A goodly throng of townfolk journeyed down from the North Shore to wish Coach Charlie McGuinness's "Yachtsmen" bon voyage and many touchdowns. More than 150 more Marbleheaders will make the trek to the southland over the road. A few already are on the way sans motors.

Following the example of the Columbian Lions in their successful transcontinental jaunt to the Bowl of Roses last year, the Marbleheaders are taking their own drinking water along. Twenty-five bottles holding a total of 125 gallons or a gallon a day for every player was the shipment trundled up the gangway of the Acadia. The water piped from the artesian wells of Marblehead is full of minerals and vitamins which will keep the team up to the high mark of its 39 to 0 victory over Beverly High.

Tomorrow the Marblehead voyagers will shift ships at New York and board the Mallory liner S. S. Shawnee and make the whole trip via water.

The Marbleheaders will be in safe hands on the final sea leg for the Shawnee is skippered by Capt. Devereux, the

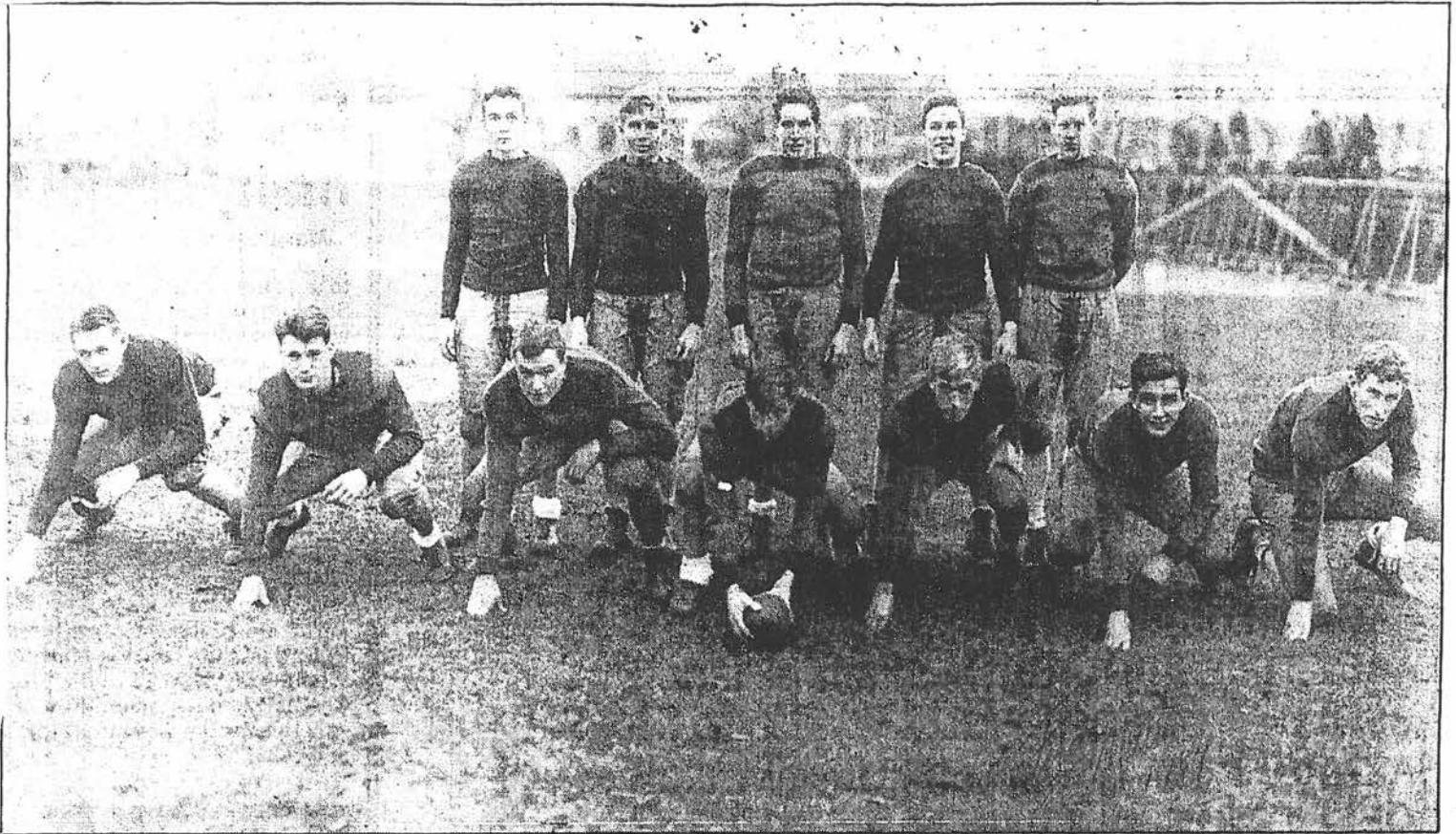

'HEADERS MAY LOSE STAR END, CUDIHY

Miami Hopes Hit by Punter's Leg Infection

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 6—Jack Cudihy, Marblehead's all scholastic end, may be out of the intersectional duel with Edison High, here Saturday because of a leg infection. The trouble, which is the outgrowth of a boil, kept the red and black husky in bed today, while his teammates worked out at Moore park.

Marblehead's chances would be greatly diminished with Cudihy out, for the star flankman does the punting for the Mackmen besides being a main cog in the aerial attack. The kicking assignment has been assumed by Fred Jermyn.

Gordon Hazell, who replaced Martin Drennan, following the latter's injury in the Peabody duel, was moved out to the wing position at the workout this morning, while Drennan was given his old assignment at right guard.

The "Headers" will conclude practice Friday evening when they run through a signal drill between the halves of the Miami-Savannah High grid duel under the arcs at Moore park. Following practice this morning, the Mackmen made a 70-mile jaunt by bus through the Redland district, and then Coach Charles McGuinness halted all further pre-game entertainment.

HEADERS READY TO TACKLE EDISON

Cudihy Returns to Old Position at End Today

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 7—After four days of intensive preliminary training, Marblehead High's gridmen are fit and ready for the big intersectional football duel with Miami Edison High, here tomorrow afternoon at Moore park.

The Headers completed training tonight when they appeared between the halves of the Savannah and Miami High combat and ran through a signal drill.

Profiting by the mistakes of other grid mentors who have invaded the southland, Coach Charles McGuinness will enter the combat with every man on his team ready for a battle under the Miami sun. Jack Cudihy, who was unable to participate in the final practice session because of a leg infection, has rounded into shape and will be in the starting line-up.

The Marblehead club eased off work last evening when McGuinness put his charges through a signal drill under the arcs at Moore park. The Yachtsmen are appearing between the halves of the Miami-Savannah High night contest. Fears that his club will be overcome with the southern hospitality were expressed by the 'Head football mentor as his charges were forced to forego a dance tendered in their honor by Charles Albury, Miami millionaire.

At a pep meeting in the Edison High this morning Coach McGuinness and "Webby" Day were speakers representing the Marblehead club. Harry Pickering, formerly of Marblehead, who has done much to arrange plans for the grid duel, together with Henry H. Filer, county chairman of the board of education, were also speakers.

The Marbleheaders have won a warm spot in the hearts of fans of this section. The club received a challenge yesterday from the Fairhaven grid eleven, located about 40 miles from Tampa. Harold Martin, formerly of the yachting capital, is coaching the Florida grid men, and is striving hard to arrange a contest before the Mackmen start the homeward trek.

Preliminary arrangements for the contest, which will start at 3 P. M. Saturday, were completed yesterday by the rival grid mentors. Twelve minute periods will be played and the game will be handled by William Harkness, referee; Richard Hunt, umpire; Chester Freeman, head linesman; Bill Huff, field judge.

This morning the Marblehead gridsters were guests at the Ida Fisher High school and were to be entertained by the University of Miami, at dinner at the Barcelona.

CAPT. GLOVER, WELLS STAR

Edison Eleven Dazzled by New Englanders' Attack—Capt. Glover Scores Three—Wells Turns in 83-Yard Run—Town Celebrates

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 8.—Displaying the most weird and dazzling assortment of plays ever seen on a Florida gridiron, the Marblehead, Mass., high school team showed New England supremacy to Southern football fans this afternoon defeating Miami Edison Cardinal High school with an avalanche of touchdowns, 52 to 12.

MARBLEHEAD GOES WILD IN SULTRY FLORIDA HEAT AND ROMPS WITH MIAMI

Lightning Speed of Deceptive Attack, Good Blocking and Spirit Carry North Shore Team to Overwhelming 52- Victory—Many New Englanders See Slaughter

MITTO Glover and Dick Wells, two New England backfield aces, led the attack for Marblehead as eight touchdowns were rolled up at will, Glover scoring three times, Wells twice, while Hazel, Jermyn and Cudaby accounted for the other three scores.

By supplying two conversions, Glover led the scoring for the day with 20 points, Ed Phelan and Stone also adding points after touchdowns for the New Englanders.

The Marblehead team was reputed to be fast and tricky before they stepped on the gridiron today, but play had not been under way minutes when the Cardinal eleven of this city as well as the crowd discovered that the visiting team were just so many magicians.

The Miami boys were dazzled with double lateral passes sailing in all directions, sweeping dashes around the ends triple reverses and other hidden ball plays which paved the way for continual scores.

Dick Wells furnished the most spectacular run of the afternoon when he intercepted a Miami pass on his own 17 yard line and waltzed 83 yards through the entire Florida team for a touchdown.

Marblehead won the toss and received, pushing the Edison team back with their dazzlers until they reached the 11 yard line where Mitto Glover, John Cudaby and Hazel executed a forward winding up with a lateral to score with Hazel carrying.

Glover converted with a line plunge and the Massachusetts

Before the first period was closed the Marblehead team had scored again on a pass from Jermyn to Cudaby and Glover's second conversion sent the score to the 14 to 0 mark.

Marblehead was leading 27 to 0 in the second quarter before the Miami team crossed the New Englanders' goal line Glover and Wells adding touchdowns in the second period.

Ed Frates, substituting for Corbett, was responsible for both Edison's scores in the second period. But these two touchdowns were merely gestures as far as the wizards from Marblehead were concerned.

With rare consistency the visitors scored twice in the third period, Glover and Wells again crossing the line, and while the Miami team was woozy and bewildered, the victors made the defeat crushing by rolling up two more scores in the final 12 minutes. Capt. Glover scoring his third touchdown and Jermyn also registered with the conversions, bringing the result of the day's total to 52 points.

Marblehead's real supremacy was indicated in the 2 first downs it made, aside from its dashes and passes to eight well earned touchdowns.

The Massachusetts boys were not in the least affected by the trip or the change of climate, as the score well indicates, and as their feats of wizardry reminded the gathering all afternoon.

It was by far the outstanding team which Edison faced and its offensive was a rare treat to Florida football fans.

Among New England fans present on the sidelines was Hal Martin, of Swampscott, formerly of Stetson University. He is now coaching Winter Haven High which during the past season won seven, tied two and lost but one game. He rooted hard for the Headers and gave them a great boost for the style of football they displayed. Nothing in Florida has

ever seen anything like it before he declared.

AFTER WORDS

The ball did plenty of traveling around Moore park in this game. Marblehead made something like 22 first downs against nine for Miami. The 'Headers' yelled mostly on a running attack, but were fairly successful in the air with four forwards completed, five incompleated and one intercepted. These figures are unofficial and do not include forward pass attempts at scoring points after touchdowns.

Miami attempted something like 23 forwards and completed eight, 11 being incomplete while 'Headers' grabbed four of the enemy forward passes. Miami was penalized about 20 yards, four fives, while Marblehead draw 10, 15, 5, 15 and 15-yard fines for a total of approximately 60 paces. And once both sides were offside and that of course was a stalemate.

The winners fumbled twice, recovering one of their own boots. Miami fumbled three times and each time a Marbleheader was on the ball. Another Miami fumble occurred but its ordinary effects were nullified by a penalty.

Marblehead scored better than a point a minute and spread its eight touchdowns at a rate of two a period.

That Miami-Savannah inter-sectional game at Moore park Friday night which was attended by the northerners was won by Miami by a score of 9 to 0 in a heavy rain. But after the evening moistness the skies cleared in time for the 'Headers' to do their stuff.

Abbot hall in Marblehead was pretty well packed for the game returns, which were broadcast under the sponsorship of The Salem News. The Western Union wire men did splendid work in both the Abbot hall and The News office at Salem, and the Wentworth public address system left little to be desired. In News square although a couple of thousand people halted for short spells, the crowd was never more than 60 or 70 at a time and you could hardly

blame people for not standing around in that bitter cold. There were many phone calls at The News, Western Union office, Marblehead police station and elsewhere, so the folks managed to keep well in touch with the occurrences at Miami.

The 26 to 7 guess on the score that appeared in this paper before the game was played had the right ideas—heavy scoring, both sides tallying and Marblehead winning, but the figures should have been multiplied by two.

Coach and Official Bewildered by the Red and Black Magic; \$1000 Check Given Dr. Eveleth; Players Sail Northward on Shawnee Today at 5 P. M.

Miami, Fla., Dec. 11—Marblehead High "Yachtsmen" were acclaimed the most mystifying football club that ever trod a southern gridiron at fetes given in their honor yesterday at the Edson High school and the Harvey Seeds Post, American Legion.

At a dinner given in honor of Coach Charles McGuinness and his victorious gridgers, at Harvey L. Seed's headquarters, Dick Huff, assistant coach at Miami University, and an official in the intersectional duel, declared that the 'Head combination showed all the skill and precision of a professional aggregation. "Sometimes it seemed as if there were seven footballs in play," declared Coach Huff, speaking of the tricky attack of the Marblehead grid heroes, and then again it seemed impossible for me to find one pigskin."

The work of the Marblehead contingent was a revelation to the southerners, according to the coach, who asserted that the exhibition would Result in Revolutionizing High School Football in this section.

Captain M. Michael Wagner, commander of the post, was toastmaster and also applauded the great performance of the Red and Black team. He referred to the hospitality extended the Miami Legion post on its visit to Marblehead in 1930, saying that the dinner was in a slight measure a return for the courteous treatment his post had received. Coach Charles McGuinness expressed belief that the intersectional contest would increase interest in High school football, and especially promote the sport in Miami. He expressed hope that in the future his club would be returning to Miami and prophesied that the 'Headers would long continue athletic relationships with the Edson Cardinals. He thanked the post members for their hospitality.

Harry Pickering, a former Marbleheader, was master of ceremonies at the luncheon at Edson High, introducing the various speakers and lauding the yachting eleven. Principal T. J. Fisher, presented a check for \$1000, Edison's Guarantee to the Marblehead school, to Dr. Samuel C. Eveleth. Referring to Edison's journey north next season when a return game will be played, Principal Fisher said that his school was looking forward to the trip with eagerness. He added that it was his hope that the Cardinals would acquit themselves as honorably as had the Yachtsmen.

Faculty Manager Edward Remick and Dr. Eveleth spoke in anticipation of the pleasure they would have in entertaining the southerners next fall. Fred White of the student council distributed souvenirs to the Marblehead gridsters. The official party, including more than 50 followers of the Yachting eleven, were escorted through the High school, following luncheon. The exodus from Miami started yesterday with scores of followers starting on the long trail back to Marblehead. The Marblehead High club will embark this afternoon at 5 o'clock on the S. S. Shawnee on the first leg of the long ocean voyage to New York city, and then home.

At hand is a copy of the Miami Herald of Sunday. It reaches us via Marblehead parties and contains an account of the 'Head-Edison game. An eight-column headline says "Marblehead's razzle-dazzle attack smothered Cardinals 52 to 12." The first line of the story is "Stars fell on Miami Edison." Further the story speaks of the northerners as executing tricks that would have done credit to Houdini in his heyday." The winners as "sweeping to a ridiculously easy victory over the bewildered Cardinals." Marbleheaders are called "magicians" also. Wells was "swivel hipped."

Early in October, 1934, it was arranged that the Marblehead High team would travel to Miami, Florida to play Edison High for a post-season game. Coach Charlie McGuinness took a squad of 23 to Florida via the Atlantic Ocean. The team went by boat the day after Thanksgiving for New York City where the squad boarded the S. S. Shawnee for the trip to Florida.

Marblehead amazed the sporting world as it defeated the Miami team 52-12. Marblehead established a 14-0 lead in the first period and widened that advantage to 27-0 at halftime. At the end of three it was 40-12 in Marblehead's favor. The Headers scored a pair of touchdowns for good measure in the final period. Web Day was the team captain for the game.

Dick Wells and Mitto Glover each had two touchdowns, and the other Marblehead touchdowns were scored by Gordie Hazel, Dick Messinger, John Cudihy, and Fred Jermyn. Four of the Marblehead touchdowns were on passes, one each by Wells, Jermyn, Cudihy, and Walter Fader. Pete Stone and Ed Phelon each had a placekick conversion. Glover rushed for a conversion and he caught a pass for another.

At a dinner meeting feting the Marblehead team in Miami, Dick Huff, an assistant coach at Miami University and an official at the game, declared that the Marblehead combination showed the skill and precision of a professional aggregation.

"Sometimes it seemed as if there were seven footballs in play, and then again it seemed impossible for me to find one pigskin," he said. By now Marblehead's teams were beginning to be called the Magicians.

The Marblehead High athletic treasury received a \$1,000 guarantee for the game. Please remember that in 1934 the nation was barely recovering from a depression. Think of how much that 1934 amount would be worth today!

MARBLEHEADERS KNUCKED 'EM OFF THEIR SEATS AT MIAMI

Plan Home Reception

Marblehead is planning a rousing reception for them when they return home with banquets, parades, red fire, speeches, etc.

When Mitto Glover, whose ancestor, Gen. Glover ferried Washington across the Delaware in the turning point of the Revolutionary War, Dick Welles, Messinger, Fader, Loveday, Jermyn, Gagnon or other backs were given the ball they went places because their mates were able to clean out by efficient blocking.

The timing of the plays was somewhat like what you might expect of Notre Dame or Minnesota, and the score piled up at Miami which was no way to treat hosts. Miami folks are strong in praise of the team, according to reports and say that they have learned something for the future.

The squad is in good shape for the return home which again will be by boat with McGuinness pointing out the sights.

Some people think that Marblehead's defeat of Edison High 52 to 12 will take all the interest out of the Edison game at Marblehead next year. We do not think so. Salem beat Tallahassee 44 to 7 down there and yet drew well when the Florida eleven came here in 1926. A team that comes 1500 miles is bound to be something of an attraction no matter what its playing ability. Then too Marbleheaders will support the game strongly and if they do that will mean a crowd large enough to pay the freight of the game.

DAVE LOVE of Marblehead has been so impressed by the victorious season of the McGuinness men that he will furnish his own torch and red fire in the parade to welcome the triumphant football troupe of jugglers when they arrive home.

"The Spirit of '76" as depicted in the glorious painting in Abbot hall was well exemplified by the present generation that went to battle at Miami.

Marblehead high eleven made a big hit in the South, but Edison, when it comes North in 1935, to return the visit of the Yachtsmen, is bound to make many friends. If the two teams had their game at the 'Head Saturday, the southerners would have been initiated into real wintry weather and it would have taken the boys several days to be thawed out.

Roy Winslow, former Marblehead high tackle a few years ago, has won his varsity football letter at Springfield College.

The victorious Marblehead grid squad is heading northward once again and the Yachtsmen will arrive home Saturday morning. A gala reception is being planned by the fans of the town for the boys.

As an aftermatch of the Marblehead invasion of Miami which ended Tuesday, when the Yachtsmen boarded a steamer for New York, the 'Head outfit was declared to be the most mystifying football club that has trod a Southern gridiron for a decade. This compliment was paid to the team at a banquet Monday night by Asst. Coach Dick Huff of Miami University.

MARBLEHEAD FOOTBALL FANS JAM ABBOT HALL TO HEAR MIAMI GAME

**News Broadcast Thrills Crowd; Large Chart
Set Up Stage Helped to Follow Victory
March by Locals; Telegram Is Sent**

Marblehead, Dec. 10—Packing Abbot hall literally to the doors, over 2000 rabid Marblehead football fans heard the play-by-play description of the Marblehead-Edison High game at Miami Saturday afternoon, in which the local lads triumphed by a 52 to 12 score. A direct telegraph wire from the field to an ante-room in the hall brought the story of the game and it was broadcast to the waiting fans over the amplifying system with Thomas Hussey, Jr., local radio announcer, at the microphone. On the stage a large chart of the field was set up and Assistant Coach Art Rogers of Lynn Classical followed the game with a miniature football which further enabled the fans to follow the progress of the contest.

The High school band and a group of cheer leaders lent additional color to the festivities and the stately building fairly rocked on its foundations every time Marblehead scored and the subsequent cheers made the welkin ring.

An excellent description of the contest was given by the reporters at Miami and Mr. Hussey's trained radio voice relayed the information to the fans, who filled not only the large auditorium but

Jammed the Stairways and the lower hall, where loud-speakers were also installed. A loud-

speaker had been placed outside the building and there was a steady stream of cars passing the building all afternoon, pausing long enough to get the latest report before proceeding.

At the close of the contest, a telegram bearing over 500 names was dispatched to the team congratulating them on their victory. It was paid for by five cent donations from those whose names were affixed.

The broadcast was made possible through the generosity of The Salem Evening News and Harold Hodgkinson secured the amplifying system, which was installed by Wire Inspector Charles B. Tucker, aided by Damon Tucker and Nathan Tucker. William Ibach of Clifton made the arrangements for the telegraph company and George Keating was the operator at the key. The chart of the field was made by Frank D. Chandler.

The police were aided in keeping order by members of Post 32, American Legion, although they had but little to do. The crowd was orderly. School Committeeman W. Gerry Martin was in general charge.
