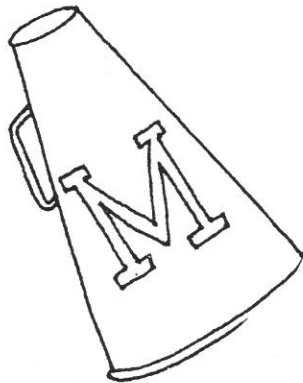

# NOTABLE FOOTBALL MEN ARE EXPECTED TO VIEW NIGHT GAME WEDNESDAY

DAILY EVENING ITEM—LYNN, MASS. MONDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 1923

Night football will be tried at the General Electric athletic field, West Lynn, Wednesday evening. Tufts College Second team will meet the General Electric Engineers and the game is expected to be witnessed by a notable football gathering. Leading coaches and men of authority on football have been invited. The kickoff is carded for 7.45 o'clock.

Bob Fisher of Harvard, Frank Cavanaugh of Boston College, Eddie Casey of Tufts, Dr. Whelan of Boston University, Cleo O'Donnell of Holy Cross, and their coaching staffs, have been extended invitations to attend the game.

From a sporting viewpoint, the game is a real novelty in this section, but the possibilities of the game proving a boost for Lynn industries is also regarded as even more important than the game.

The Lynn field will be illuminated by more than 50 flood lights of 1000 candle-power each. These are placed around the field in seven units. It is claimed that it will be possible to follow the ball at all times. The direct lights are so focused so as not to interfere with the players' eyes.

Officials of the General Electric company are deeply interested in the experiment. If the game is a success, it is believed that various colleges and athletic clubs will adopt the system of floodlighting for night athletic activities.

In many colleges, there would be more young men as candidates for the football, baseball and other athletic teams if night practice could be held. These students have late afternoon classes and are not able to report for the various squads. Tennis, baseball, basketball and other sports are possible under the floodlights, it is claimed.

Coach William I. Joyce of Lynn Classical is to referee the game with Charlie Moore as umpire. Charles B. McGhee is to be head linesman.

And when mention is made of the work of the capable coaches of the North Shore league you must not forget what Bob O'Keefe has shown at Revere High this season, with practically a new squad.

AND COACH Poole, just out of Dumner Academy, has done wonders Winthrop High.

THEN WE come to William Dale Jones of Marblehead. His work last Saturday was a great surprise. The way that his team drilled to meet the Red and White demonstrated that Jones not only knows football, but has the faculty of teaching it to others.

T. P. DAY, Marblehead's pepper box, was in yesterday, filled with enthusiasm over the 'Headers' showing against Classical. He also paid a tribute to Coach Joyce, when he said, "Classical has the best forward string team of any schoolboy team I ever saw, and should win the championship.
