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Marblehead Tops Curtis, 29-0, With Speedy Attack

Bay State Team Hands Staten Island Eleven Its First Defeat - Wells, Dashing 70 and 28 Yards for Scores, Is Star.

A splendidly trained Marblehead (Mass.) High School football team handed Curtis High School a decisive and wholly unlooked-for setback at Thompson's Stadium, Staten Island, yesterday. The alert New Englanders took the previously undefeated Curtis eleven by storm to roll up a 29-to-0 triumph, while a crowd of 10,000 persons looked on.

The speed and precision with which the visiting aggregation went to work was a revelation, indeed, and so smoothly did the Marblehead forces reel off their plays that the large gathering, overwhelmingly pro-Curtis, had to cheer them.

Curtis made a gallant battle in the face of the visitors' bewildering speed, and twice during the contest was within Marblehead's 10-yard line. On neither occasion, however, could the Staten Island eleven force its way past the red-jerseyed Mar-blehead forward wall to the goal.
