Danny Sullivan Stars as Headers Win, 26-6

MARBLEHEAD, Nov. 20 — Coach George Moriarty's Marblehead team defeated Swampscott High, 26 to 6, at the Reynolds Stadium here today. Danny Sullivan, a slip of a lad who had warned the bench most of the season, rose to stardom against Swampscott in the 33d annual struggle, and his 60-yard run for a touchdown in the opening period was by far the highlight of the victory.

The Moriarty-coached team demonstrated that it "catches on quickly" by utilizing a play that defeated them in last Saturday's Saugus game, a diagonal forward pass, with a "sleeper" far out of circulation. The diagonal pass figured in three of the touchdowns.

Headers Passing Game Dazzles Swampscott

Magic Men Win 26-6 by Superior Air Attack At Reynolds Field

A long delayed time bomb exploded loudly and with great effect at Reynolds field in Marblehead yesterday morning as the Red and Black of Marblehead strafed a plucky underdog Swampscott eleven, emerging on the long end of a 26-6 count. The game was a thriller with three of the five touchdowns coming in the first period. Almost 6000 fans, crowded in cordons of 10 deep all around the field, watched the game, which featured the passing attack of both clubs.

Marblehead broke the scoring ice after Captain Johnny Hawkes recovered a fumble by Charlie Ring on the Swampscott 35-yard line. In a series of uninterrupted running plays with Foster Shepard and Ed Barry splitting the assignments, the Magicians proceeded to the 6-yard Swampscott line from which Shepard on a wide sweep of his left end, piled over for the first score. Herbie Carey's placement looped neatly through the bars for the conversion.

SCULPINS SCORE

Evening the breaks, Costantini gobbled up Herbie Carey's fumble on the Marblehead's 12-yard line a few minutes later, after Swampscott, having completed a Friberg to Frechette pass for 25 yards to the Marblehead 15-yard line, was unable to break through for the score.

After the fumble Lou Rotundi picked up five yards with Billy Friberg adding the necessary yardage for a first down on the 7-yard stripe. The first try went for no gain and on the second play Friberg battered his way to the 1-yard line, taking it over on the next play. The conversion failed.

On the next kick off, Herbie Carey picked the ball up on the 5-yard line and ran it back to the Marblehead 28 before being downed. Exhibiting a play-calling prowess that has been absent from the club in many games this fall, the first play of the series was a diagonal "sleeper" pass from Barry to Danno the Dyna-mite Sullivan, collecting the pigskin on the 40-yard Marblehead line and scuttling the distance for the score, with a horde of desperate Sculpins chasing him down the field. The run was the longest of the game and its big thrill.

Carey's conversion was blocked.

HEADERS ON PARADE

Two plays after the next kickoff the first chukker ended. On the first play of the second period a Friberg to Gillen pass barely missed for what would have been a sure score. Then from its own 15-yard line, the Red and Black team proceeded on an 85-yard drive which brought it once again into pay dirt.

A feature of the drive was a Shepard-to-Odell pass at midfield which the blonde left end of the Marblehead club snatched from two Swampscott blockers. With Carey, Chapman and Barry splitting the running assignments, Marblehead drove to the Swampscott 21-yard line. There a penalty for clipping set the Red and Black machine back on the Swampscott 36 line.

On the second play, using the same pass play which had scored before, Shepard tossed to Carey who rolled through six would-be tacklers to score standing up. His conversion this time was good, making the score 20-6, which stood at the end of the half.

In the third period the Swampscott line stiffened and the Head attack was able to go nowhere. The kicking of Barry and Friberg featured the period until close to the end when a sudden spurt of activity in the Swampscott camp put Marblehead back on its heels. A pass from Gillen to Friberg was completed for 25 yards on the Marblehead 10-yard line. Two line plunges netted nothing and the period ended.

LOU MUFFS PASS

On the third play of the series, the first of the final quarter, a Friberg to Frechette pass fell incomplete. On the final play a beautiful pass, right into Rotundi's hands from Friberg, bounced out, as he stood in the end zone. Marblehead took the ball on downs, and two plays later another scare was thrown in the Red and Black ranks, when the club was penalized for holding, the ball being put in play on the 1-yard line.

With the crowd straining at his back, Ed Barry kicked out from the end zone to the 40-yard Marblehead line.

ROLL ON, MAGIC MEN!

Swampscott downed the ball on

the 36-yard line and there a passing attack from Billy Friberg was smothered by Marblehead, which took the ball on downs. Here the 'Head machine kicked to the Swampscott 28-yard line. A quick kick by Friberg on the third play was downed by Hammond on the Marblehead 29-yard line. And from there the 'Head machine started to roll for its final score.

Carey ripped off a first down to the 48-yard line. Then Chapman completed a flat pass to Odell on the Swampscott 33-yard line.

On the third play, the Barry to Sullivan passing combination which had successfully scored earlier in the game, pulled the same pass play, with Danno hopping between two burly Sculpins to get the pass, and then scurrying like a scared rabbit down the sidelines to the Swampscott 4-yard line where he was toppled. From there Cary plunged for the final touchdown. The conversion was blocked.

A few plays later the game ended. Most remarkable aspect of the game was the fact that two of the four Marblehead touchdowns came directly from a passing attack, while a third score was set up by another pass. Early in the season the air attack clicked, but for the past six weeks, its effectiveness was minimized. Danny Sullivan, who spelled Bob Hammond most of the year as quarterback, emerged as the greatest hero of the game, scoring on the longest run of the day, and setting up the final touchdown. Herbie Carey, exhibiting the same power and drive that made him outstanding earlier in the season, was the greatest back on the field. In the line, Hawkes, Brady, Hamilton and Odell all shone.

FRIBERG KICKS WELL

Swampscott's Billy Friberg need take no back seat to any other back on the field. His kicking was outstanding and his passing was the equal of any the Head machine has played against this year. His passing was a constant threat and but for some unlucky receiving would have brought more points to the Sculpin total.

Although the score makes the game look easy for Marblehead, there was no indication of this in the actual play. Until Marblehead's final touchdown in the last period, the game might have shifted either way. Earl Frechette, Gordon Stensrud and Captain Steve Howe were brilliant in the line.

Four major penalties, three for holding and one for clipping, were called during the game, and all were levied against Marblehead.

Moriarthy Air Magic

Marblehead High Magicians in Decisive Win Over Sculpins of Swampscott High in Turkey Day Annual Game at Reynolds Stadium 26 to 6

Marblehead, Nov. 21—Superior air power, combined with a potent ground offensive, gave the Marblehead High Magicians a 26 to 6 victory over Swampscott in their 33d contest of the traditional Turkey day series at Reynolds' stadium yesterday morning before 5500 fans. The series now stands with the Red and Black having recorded 18 wins and five deadlocks and with 10 marked on the credit side of the Sculpin grid ledger.

Coach George Moriarty concocted a slick pre-dinner cocktail, using as ingredients a grand running game, with two jiggers of aerial blitz and more than a modicum of neat grid strategy to flavor the mixture so that it tickled the palates of 'Head fans.

As a sample of the strategy employed, King George shoved Sullivan into the lineup at a critical moment. Sullivan has not been on the receiving end of a pass since he has played North Shore football and further to confuse the opposition the orders were to pass on third down with only one foot to go. The move caught the enemy flatfooted, for Neddo Barry slipped over to the right flank and shot a diagonal heave to "Sully," who was off like a shot for a 60-yard scoring ramble.

Swampscott, too, uncovered a nifty overhead game, with Bill Friberg, ace hurler, completing several long heaves which served as serious threats to the Red and Black. Early in the fourth period Friberg tossed to Frechette, standing in the Red and Black end zone, but witchcraft must have numbed the fingers of the receiver, for the oval trickled to the ground.

Lady Luck distributed her favors very impartially, the Headers making their initial count early in the first period on a break. The fickle lady smiled on the downhearted Sculpin warriors minutes later when Carey fumbled and Louis Rotundi recovered to set the stage for the long Blue tally.

As if to recompense the fans for the nasty deal handed out in the 1940 classic, the weather man provided perfect conditions for the battle of the two clubs. The weather man's gift for the day was as ideal as if it had been planned weeks in advance. With a warm sun and an almost entire absence of wind spectators could have watched the melee in their shirt sleeves.

Swampscott might well have been discouraged from the outset, for, after Herb Carey's opening kickoff had grounded on the Blue 35, Charlie Ring fumbled on the next play, with Capt. Johnny Hawkes recovering the bounding leather. Nine plays

for the initial tally, Foster Shepard sweeping his own left end for the ultimate five yards. In the parade to this count, Ed Barry, Shepard and Herb Carey lugged the leather. Herbert parted the timbers for the extra counter.

Modern stagecraft was rivaled for a thriller minutes later. Taking the return kickoff for a 20-yard run-back, Charlie Ring promoted an invasion of Marblehead territory which ended when Bill Friberg was hauled on the Red and Black 15. Here the Headers dug in and took possession of the pigskin on downs. Carey on

the second play, was blocked hard and the oval popped from his grasp. Dario Constantini recovered on the Header 17, to spot the ball for Swampscott's lone tally. Rotundi powered his way to the 12. Friberg advanced to the seven and, after Rotundi had spelled Billy on one play, Friberg sliced off tackle for the score. Materra failed to convert.

Carey, on a 20-yard gallop brought back Materra's return kickoff to the Marblehead 30, Capt. Stephen Howe having a difficult task to halt the Herculean hustler. On third down, with only a foot to go, Marblehead pulled its master bit of psychology, Barry slipping out to right end and flipping to Dan Sullivan. Danno, with two backs and the center in hot pursuit, bested the trio in a race to the goal line. Carey's kick was blocked.

Some sensational broken field running contributed by Herbert Carey gave Marblehead its third touchdown in the second stanza. To produce this count, the Red and Black was forced to stage a march up field from its own 10, the procession being climaxed by a nicely executed pass, with Carey on the business end. Stalled for two downs on the Martin men's 35 after rolling like a juggernaut upfield, Sheppard uncorked a flat pass to Herbert, who

for the score. In his progress Herb was struck, grabbed and buffeted by no less than six defensive Swampscott stalwarts, but managed to hustle forward until he crossed the last stripe. Just to prove he was not winded Herbert placekicked the conversion.

In the third Swampscott made a most serious threat. Carey's punt was blocked by Eddie Gillen on the Red and Black 39. Louis Rotundi and Bill Friberg lost in attempting to crash Marblehead's frontier. Ed Gillen then faded and swished the ball 25 yards to Friberg, standing on the 10-yard ribbon just before the lines were changed for the final chucker. Dave Larkin submarined to halt Rotundi and then Friberg, on a ground assault. Friberg shied a pass to Earl Frechette which Barry ruined. Friberg, on fourth down, rifled the ball to Lou Rotundi, standing all alone in the end zone, but the ball squirted from the receiver's fingers.

Inaugurating the Headers' final touchdown procession in the ultimate stanza, Friberg pulled a quick-kick which Dave Terhune grounded on Marblehead's 25. Herb Carey broke away for a long canter ending on the midfield stripe. Harry Odell brought the ball nearer pay dirt in snaring "Chipper" Chapman's pass for a run to the blue 33. Carey moved the ball closer, running off right tackle to the 25. History repeated itself, for Barry moved over back of the referee and pegged to Dan Sullivan, who was off like a flash to the enemy two-yard stripe. With one mighty smash at center Carey scored.

Both coaches then began shooting in monogram substitutes. It makes two straight wins for Coach Moriarty in the Sculpin series.

While in all-around team work the Magicians were no less than a

standpoint held their own with the Red and Black stars. Capt. Steve Howe was a bulwark of strength in the line and his passbacks were done flawlessly. Walt Kester also stood out in the forward wall, as did Earl Frechette at left wing. The Swampscott ballcarrying coterie were ever dangerous but were afforded extreme poor coverage. Friberg and Charlie Ring were tops.

For the Red and Black, Ned Barry, Foster Shepard and Herb Carey were the stars from an offensive standpoint. The loss of Shepard in the third period may have cost the Magicians another touchdown. In the line, from end to end, the Magicians glittered. Capt. John Hawkes and Dave Larkin were gluttons for punishment, while Odell, Pem Hamilton, Jack Brady and Hourihan rated the plaudits they received.

Snappy Marblehead Club Romps With Barry, Larkin Peabody 20-0 in Opener

In Limestone

Magicians Score in First, Second and Fourth Periods to Give Seeglitz Worst Opening Day Licking in Years—Peabody Comes to Life in Third Period But Bogs After 53-Yard March —Joyce Scouts Game for Classical

Youngful George Moriarty of Marblehead yesterday accomplished in his first attempt what his old high school grid teacher, Tom Whelan, couldn't do in seven tries when his Magicians triumphed over Peabody in convincing fashion at the Leo Buckley Stadium in Tannertown by the score of 20 to 0.

THIRD PERIOD FLURRY

Save for a flurry in the third period when the Tanners marched 53 yards from their own 28-yard line to the Marblehead 19-yard stripe, Frankie Pierce doing most of the ball juggling, the Tanners weren't in the game at all yesterday with the snappy Marblehead club.

Marblehead drew first blood midway in the opening period when Quarterback Dan Sullivan went over from the one-yard line. In the second period, the Magicians rang up their second touchdown when John Chapman tossed a 30-yard pass to Charlie Kelley who snagged it on the Peabody 10-yard stripe and scampered to pay dirt. Fullback Dave Larkin converted to make it 13-0.

In the final period, Marblehead traveled 45 yards for their final score. This time Larkin ended the drive with a 13-yard sweep of right end, scoring standing up. He again converted for the final point.

Here the Magicians wasted no time in taking advantage of the break. On the first play, Barry tore through the center of the Peabody line for nine yards. Chapman made it first down, three yards for a touchdown to go on the next play. Barry now took it on a wide sweep of his own left end and nearly went foot line but stepped on the one-foot line but the halt was only momentary. Quarterback Sullivan pushing it over on the very next play.

A bad pass from center prevented the point after touchdown try. Larkin later converted twice. A penalty and another break on a kick led to the second touchdown for the fast moving Moriarty club.

The Headers had reached the Peabody 28-yard stripe after the second kickoff and on fourth down, about four to go, Quarterback Sullivan decided to play it safe and called for a kick. This time Barry kicked out on the Peabody eleven.

Murray ripped off five yards on the first Peabody play but King was detected clipping and a 15-yard penalty put the Seeglitz club back on its own ten. A Murray bleached offside and a Murray fumble got the ball as far as the Peabody 20 when Murray was forced to kick again. This time Chapman downed the ball for Marblehead on the Peabody 47.

Barry picked up three yards and the next play saw the fanciest offensive offering of the day ending in a touchdown. Chapman started for his right behind a wall of interference but as he neared the Peabody sideline, he suddenly stopped and threw a pretty diagonal pass which Charlie Kelley gathered in on the Peabody 14. The Tanner defenders, Pierce and Murray, couldn't come close to Kelley as he scored standing up. Larkin quickly made it 3 to 0 with a pretty placement

Peabody had a chance to go places in the same second period when Capt. Walt Kardenetz recovered a Dave Larkin fumble on the Marblehead 31 and Almeida gave the Tanners their initial first down on the Magician 28. Here the Magicians tightened and regained possession of the ball.

In the third period, the Peabody club really began to move. Nevins kicked off for the Tanners and Marblehead worked the ball up to its 33 before being forced to kick. Fere Barry got away another nice boot to the Peabody 28.

The Tanners showed plenty of steam in the drive that was to follow. Pierce lost five yards on the first play but Murray got it back on the next plunge. Then Pierce battered his way to the Peabody 43. On the very next play, Pierce again ripped forward for 12 yards and another first down on the Head 45 yard stripe. Almeida and Pierce two more for a third first down on the Marblehead 34.

The Marblehead club appeared to have something to worry about when on the next play Pierce fought his way to the Marblehead 10. Here the Headers called time out and it seemed to work like a charm. Moriarty sent in Charlie Prince to back up the line and he piling up the Peabody attack. He made three successive tackles as the only Tanner sustained march of the game petered out.

In the fourth period as Peabody strove desperately to get its offense working once more, Dave Larkin intercepted a Tanner pass on the Peabody 45 and from this point Marblehead again headed for the end zone.

Ed Barry and Dave Larkin were the spearheads of this drive. Barry passed to Chapman for seven yards and then he carried to the Peabody 34 on the next play. A Barry to Girouard pass nullified a penalty for too many times out and then Sullivan made it first down on the Tanner 10. Chapman lost three yards but on the next play Larkin made a pretty run around right end to score standing up.

At this point Bill Seeglitz and Moriarty send in a horde of substitutes, Peabody featuring Tony Krawchuck, brother of last year's Maxie who looked good getting off several passes although none of them clicked.

Marblehead looked impressive in the first game of the season while Peabody also showed up well with a green inexperienced team. Interested spectators at the game were Coach Bill Joyce of Classical and his assistants. Classical plays Marblehead next Saturday at Manning Bowl.

The game was witnessed by 5000 fans.
