

# MHS Hall of Fame Night is Dec. 3

The Marblehead High School Hall of Fame Night will be held Thursday, Dec. 3, at the VFW on West Shore Drive. The social hour is from 6-7 p.m. with dinner starting at 7.

Inductees are:

Jim Lennox (1932-35) who was a three-year starter for Coach Charlie McGuinness, an outstanding interior offensive lineman and defensive end for three of MHS's finest teams that compiled a 23-5-3 record.

At 175 pounds, he was the second heaviest player on 1935 team. Best known for blocking and tackling, Lennox scored two TD's as the right end in 1935, the second of which was a 60-yard pass from Dick Wells to a score winning TD in a 21-13 win over Edison High of Miami at Joel Reynolds Playground.

Art Carey (1938-40) was on Coach McGuinness' last team in '38 (7-3-0), Trim Roberts' only team in 1939 (2-5-3), and was captain of the 1940 NEC Champions under the first year Coach George Moriarty (8-2-0). He was recognized as a fine two-way player in backfield and an outstanding blocker in single-wing offense. The fine running back scored his first TD in 1939 and scored 43 points in 1940. He also had a successful football career at Dartmouth.

Herb Carey (1939-41) was a

starter as an interior lineman in 1939 when he was a sophomore. He moved into the backfield with his brother in 1940. Carey was an excellent defensive player as linebacker in NEC championship 8-2 season. He scored 37 points in 1941, including MHS's only TD (an 83-yard kickoff return) in a 28-6 loss against Massillon, Ohio, in MHS' last inter-sectional game.

He also scored two TDs and kicked a 2-point conversion in a 26-6 Thanksgiving win in his final game. He attended Kimball Union and then had a fine football career at Dartmouth.

Fred Grant (1949-51) played under coach Herm Hussey and was a two-way starter at right tackle on the 1950 NEC (8-1-1) champions as a junior. He earned All-Star Honors in 1951 from NEC, Salem News and Lynn Item as senior tackle.

He was also blocking and tackling star of 19-7 Thanksgiving Day win in 1951 and received football scholarship to Georgia Tech.

Daynor Prince (1961-63), under coach Noel Reebenacker, was quarterback on '62 NEC champion team, which finished 6-2-1. He threw his first TD pass as a sophomore in 1961, alternating at QB with Don Jermyn. He contributed with the lead-taking conversion pass in the 35-14 Thanksgiving Day upset.

He scored two touchdowns and threw 13 TD passes as a senior on a fine team, which lost only to Swampscott and Salem. He went on to Parsons College (Iowa) where he set passing records and earned College All Star national recognition (Hula Bowl).

Chris McGrath (1983-86) made 18 tackles against Amesbury, earning him defensive player of the week award as a freshman. Later he became team MVP as a frosh. He scored a team-leading 42 points in 1985. He was a Northeastern Conference All-Star as linebacker in 1986 when he was a co-captain and led the team with 72 points.

He won Tom McAn Award as top player on North Shore; Boston Globe Division 2 Player of the Year. He had a spectacular record at UNH. A four-year starter at linebacker, he set the record for most tackles in a season and career. He was also an ECAC All Star.

The Hall of Fame will present a special award to George Caruth for his 45 years of dedicated service to MHS football in various official and unofficial capacities.
