

'Headers Tan Peabody, 20-0

4500 See Renewal of Old Football Rivalry

PEABODY, Sept. 12—One of the hottest of schoolboy football rivalries was renewed here today when Marblehead High met Peabody High for the first time in nearly eight years and thrashed the Tanners, 20 to 0, before an opening day crowd of 4500 at Leo Buckley Memorial Stadium.

The visiting Headers, now working their magic from the T formation, put over touchdowns in each of the first, second and fourth periods.

Backs Danny Sullivan and Dave Larkin and end Charley Kelley each broke across the Peabody goal line, with Larkin placekicking two extra points. One has to go back pretty far into the records to find the Tanners absorbing a defeat of such size in an opener.

Sullivan went over from the one yard line for the first score. Norman Aberle punt for the Peabody dropped on the Tanner 3 and bounced backward to the 15 where Tanner George Almeida fell on it to keep it from crossing the goal line. In three plays Ed Barry and Johnny Chapman punched out a first down on the one-yard line with Sully squirming over on a quarterback sneak.

Kelley's romp into the end zone was the spectacular play of the game. It came in the second period and covered an over-all distance of 48 yards, with Kelley catching a 38-yard forward pass, down the alley, from Chapman, and scooting the remaining 10 yards after cleverly faking the Peabody defenders out of the play.

Larkin made his six-pointer on a second-down, fourth period scamper around the Tanner left end. Chapman, Sullivan and Ed Barry did some neat blocking to clear the way, and Davey appended a nice change of pace to fool the uprushing secondaries right at the goal line.

OPENINGS

Peabody made little headway throughout the game. A 57-yard drive midway in the third period, which carried to the visitors' 13-yard line, gave the home supporters their only real opportunity to cheer.

Frank "Dinky" Pierce did most of the ball toting on that trip and broke through the Marblehead frontier for runs of 12, 14 and 17 yards. Most of the gain was made through center Bob Riley, who was found to be injured and was replaced by Charley Prince. Charley's effective backing up stopped the Tanners' march cold.

George Almeida broke into the clear at the beginning of the fourth period and raced 18 yards to midfield. He moved across on the next try, but Dave Larkin intercepted a pass on the following play and Peabody never again violated Marblehead territory.

First downs were seven for Marblehead, six for Peabody. The visitors picked up 172 yards by rushing, the Tanners ground out a net 112 yards. Marblehead attempted six passes, completed two. One went for the touchdown, the other for a 12-yard gain in the fourth period which led up to Larkin's romp to glory. Peabody was penalized a total of 35 yards, Marblehead was set back 10 yards.

Sidelights

Ed Barry really had it Saturday. His speed and drive was the equal of most college backs.

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Jim Jordan was terrific. Rushing both passer and kicker, he was in there very fast.

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The down-field work of the ends, both Girouard and Kelley, was something to watch. Their tackling was deadly.

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Capt. Jack Brady without any question was the outstanding lineman on the field.

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One of the main reasons why the Headers' passing is so successful is the fine blocking in the line, giving both "Chipper" and "Bud" plenty of time to spot a receiver.

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Incidentally, the work of Lewis at tackle on the offense was very good, especially in the second period, on that drive from midfield to the one yard line, when a fumble was recovered by Classical.

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Bill Bray was the iron man in the line, playing the whole game without relief.

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Chapman and Barry form a combination that will hard to beat, and with Larkin getting better every game, it looks like the best backfield in the State.

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Amesbury at Amesbury on Saturday—and watch out. They are tough to beat on their own field.

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Marblehead is fortunate in having two centers like Riley and Prince. They are tops in what in our humble opinion is the toughest spot on the team to play.

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Most of the fans are glad to hear that the Lynn English game will be played in Marblehead as originally scheduled. This will make it six away and five at home, giving fans a break on gas coupons.

Magic Makers Too Good And Classical Bows

Barry and Chapman Steer Moriarty- men to 13-0 Win by Overhead Attack

Classical's long string of 20 victories came to an end Saturday in Manning bowl, when a more experienced Marblehead white jerseyed club defeated the Joycelets 13-0. Unable to stow away the game with its running attack the Magic Makers were obliged to turn to the air to realize victory and the Ed Barry-Chipman combination turned the trick.

The Moriarty-men carried a decided edge as the result of long weeks of practice together by a 20-0 decision over Peabody. Classical showed oodles of power, but the club was not prepared to tackle the powerhouse Yachtsmen, an all-around capable machine, with one of the finest corps of back presented by any visiting club in the Bowl.

PASS CLICKS TWICE

The touchdowns in the first and fourth periods were scored on identical plays by Barry and Chapman. Late in the opening period, after Classical had forced the battling in 'Head territory, Chapman started to circle his right end. Smiarowski had the play spotted and bore down on the ball carrier. Halted an instant by Smiarowski's one-hand tackle, Chappie wriggled loose and tossed a 25-yard pass to Barry at midfield. Valenti was drawn out of position and Bob McNulty, safety man, endeavored to cover. He leaped, but the ball evaded his hands and Barry was off down the sidelines. Valenti, Classical's ace distance runner, essayed a stern chase, but Barry scored. Dave Larkin counted the conversion.

Classical made a desperate attempt to equalize late in the second period but the advance bogged on the Marblehead 30 and the Red and White obliged to kick. Classical was stronger

in the third period but the club was unable to get anywhere. Another attempt was made in the final period and the windbag carried to the Marblehead 19, where the Yachtsmen gained possession.

Three plays netted two first downs and with the ball on the Marblehead 45 Dan Sullivan called a duplicate of the first scoring play but reversed the assignments of the pair of participants. This time it was Barry who did the tossing. Again the Classical secondaries were decoyed out of position. Chapman speared the ball on the Classical 25 and ran the remaining distance without interference. Again Larkin split the bars but the conversion was not allowed as unnecessary roughness was detected by the officials. His second attempt was blocked.

JOYCELETS LACK WORK

Classical's line stood up brilliantly in their first test and Joe Russell and Al Putts were towers of strength at tackle. Mecco Smiarowski, backing up the line performed brilliantly and diagnosed the plays as was the case last year when he was selected as one of the stand-out schoolboy pivots in Eastern Massachusetts. Charlie McGhee, at end, part of the fray turned in some good bits of work while Zimman and Shanoski did their work in excellent fashion.

In the Classical backfield the McNulty brothers, Bob and

Ray, bore the brunt of the ball carrying and they toiled unceasingly. Bob performed yeoman service on defense. He intercepted a 'Head aerial on the Classical five in the third period and returned the ball 40 yards when he was brought down by Remick. Rudy Valenti played his heart out and will be heard from when he gains experience.

On the Magicians side of the fence Barry and Chapman were immense, a pair of backs to gladden the heart of any schoolboy coach. Bray and Brady were big cogs in the line and Prince's play on defense aided materially in keeping Classical in check. The club is a fine drilled machine which plays good hard football to the limit, and bound to be troublesome for any opponent.

The heat took terrific toll from the youngsters and they were completely fagged out at the end of hostilities after working under pressure for 44 minutes, too long for scholastic football clubs at this stage of the season.

"What a Team!" Exclaim Fans as Moriarty's Men Whitewash Classical's Champs 13 to 0

What a team! What a game!

Superlatives are tame in describing the great little grid squad that invaded Lynn last Saturday afternoon and administered the first defeat in two years to the champion Classical aggregation, trouncing the Shoe City team 13 to 0.

"Skip this game," says a Lynn sports writer. "In fact, forget it was played."

Well, he may be able to forget the game, but there are fans galore who will remember the Marblehead-Classical game for many a year.

And Coach George J. Moriarty—who local fans thought they had lost to Lynn in a coach switch at the opening of the school year—can grin with satisfaction in the direction of the Lynn politicians. The pols got their coach but Moriarty got a feather in his cap which won't make it any harder to pick up a higher paid job later on.

While Marblehead gridsters were tearing into Classical their ancient rivals in Swampscott were demonstrating a speed and prowess which presages a lively game when the Sculpins and Headers clash on Thanksgiving Day.

Swampscott high crushed its first foe of the season on Saturday when it walked all over Reading High and came through with a 25 to 0 win. If the lads from Sculpinville continue in that manner, and the Red and Black outfit does the same, the Thanksgiving Day contest will be a pip.

According to observers, Coach Martin is presenting to Swampscott rooters the fastest outfit that town has boasted in many seasons.

The Classical squad was no pushover for the Magicians, who fought hard all the way to defeat the gridders from the larger school, who have been victorious in 20 straight games.

Six or seven thousand rooters assembled at Manning Bowl to see Marblehead battle Classical, and they got their money's worth, although not exactly the kind of score they were looking for—at least, all but the loyal supporters of Moriarty's men, who put their dough-raise-me on the Red and Black.

Lynn sportsmen concede that Marblehead was out in front all the way, from the first kick-off to the final whistle. With a handful of veterans to back them up the Magicians are an outfit which can go places this season, and the wins scored in the first game with Peabody and Saturday's tussle with Lynn will bolster their morale for future tough nuts to crack.

Coach Bill Joyce's boys put up a hard battle against the Headers, but they were outclassed in every department, despite the superiority in numbers enjoyed by the Classical institution.

Here and there throughout the game Classical put on a burst of this, their first game of the year, speed, which may indicate that on they were not yet primed for battle but will have something worth watching in future events.

But Saturday the Magicians outclassed, outdistanced, outkicked and outgeneraled the best the Shoe City had to offer, including Bob McNulty, who Bill Joyce hopes to develop as a passer and pigskin booter.

Variety is the spice of life and the life of a gridiron contest, and for variety the Marblehead aggregation was in there with bells on. Shifting from one play to another, the Yachting Capital boys had their rivals wondering what was coming next.

Ed Barry and Chipper Chapman grabbed top honors in the contest, making long treks goalward to capture the two touchdowns of the afternoon.

Opening the tourney, Classical received the ball on its 34-yard stripe when Larkin kicked to Valenti, the latter joining Bob McNulty in a try for first down. After three plays Bob kicked Marblehead's 24-yard line.

Larkin fumbled in the first play by the Yachtsmen and Lynn recovered on Marblehead's 25. Classical had a chance to do something but muffed it and Bob McNulty kicked a punt to the Marblehead nine-yard line.

After a first down by Chapman three more attempts ended with Barry booting to McNulty to the 46, where after Lynn tried vainly to gain, McNulty kicked to Chapman on the 18.

Chapman made a try but was stopped, then Barry made a great little run but fumbled the ball, which Brady recovered, giving Marblehead the ball on the 32.

Larkin gained three on one play, lost eight on the next when he was tackled by Russell. Then Chapman fell back to heave a 25-yard pass to Barry, which the latter tucked away and raced 50 yards for the first score of the game, which Larkin polished off by kicking the extra point.

Larkin kicked after the touchdown, the pill dropping on the Classical 42 where Fox awaited it. The period ended as Kelley advanced five yards.

With only five inches to make for a fourth down Classical chose to kick, but McNulty fumbled and the kick failed to click, Lynn losing the ball on the 42.

This was Marblehead's opening, and Barry, Larkin and Chapman in three downs got the ball to the Classical 26. Barry sounded center

on a spinner for 10 yards, then Here a pass was upset, followed hoofed it to the one-yard stripe, by a fumble by Chapman, and Ray McNulty recovered for Lynn on the one yard line.

After Murphy kicked Lynn out of danger Marblehead started its march of victory again, carrying the ball as far as Classical's 15-yard line, where it was lost on downs.

For a while Classical showed a little more spirit, and Bob McNulty made a wedge in the Headers line for a 23 yard gain, the first really sizeable slice of territory hacked off by the Shoe City huskies.

As the half drew to a close Classical hammered away and finally reached the Marblehead 30-yard stripe, where Bill Joyce's men surrendered the ball on downs. Two plays more and the whistle sounded.

Opening the second half Classical received but made little progress and finally had to kick. The punt was blocked and Kelley recovered for Marblehead on the 45.

Barry sailed away for an eighty-yard cruise, Larkin added a yard, and then the Headers lost out on Lynns 47 when a pass was intercepted by McNulty, who hiked away for a fifty yard run. Barry tackled the Lynn hero and McNulty fumbled, with Remick recovering for Marblehead on the latter's 45-yard stripe.

Marblehead won its second touchdown early in the final session, after a couple of interceptions. McNulty stopped a Marblehead pass at the close of the third period on his 47 yard stripe, but Marblehead got the ball right back when Barry stepped in front of a McNulty aerial on his own 40.

Behind a phalanx of interference Barry made first down, then tossed to Chipper Chapman, who tore lose and marathoned across the goal stripe. Larkin converted, but the boys were a bit rough and the extra point was lost on a penalty. From then on it was a substitute holiday.

Mighty Marblehead Roars To Win Over Classical, 13-0

The mighty Magic Makers of Marblehead roared into Manning Bowl and handed defending champion Lynn Classical its first defeat in 20 starts, scoring in the first and finals periods to win 13 to 0 and stamp themselves

one of the outstanding teams in the state, before 10,000 at Lynn, yesterday afternoon.

Two of the finest running and passing backs to come along in years, were unveiled by the Headers, with right halfback Eddo Barry and left halfback Johnny "Chipper" Chapman each tallying in practically the same fashion.

In the first period the game developed into a punting duel, with Davy Larkin, fullback, and Barry, turning in some long kicks for Marblehead. Chapman swept the ends for short, snappy gains.

Classical got a break when Dave Larkin fumbled on his own 28 and Frank Kelley recovered. The champs attempted two rushes and two passes but Marblehead refused to yield under pressure and Classical failed to capitalize. After an exchange of punts the period ended.

Bob McNulty, Lynn right halfback, punted to Marblehead's 17 to open the second stanza. Barry skirted right end for 14 yards to bring it up to the 31. Barry tried it by land again and fumbled the ball, but no damage was done as left guard Bill Bray recovered for the Magic Makers.

"Chipper" Chapman then took the ball, started on an end run, but center "Mecca" Smiarowski broke through the line, forcing Chapman to shift by him. It all worked to perfection, Chapman unleashing a 25-yard pass to midfield, where Barry jumped high in the air, taking it on the gallop. He outsped two Classical chargers for the first score of the game.

Dave Larkin stepped in and made the score 7 to 6, with a kick from placement.

The final score of the game came when Bob McNulty flipped a pass in the final period that Barry intercepted on his 40 and took it ten yards to midfield. Two rushes lost a yard and then Barry put first touchdown in reverse, passing to Chapman on the 35, who went all the way to paydirt.

Dave Larkin again kicked the extra point, but Marblehead was penalized 15-yards for unnecessary roughness and the game ended 13 to 0.

MARBLEHEAD TOPS PEABODY 20 TO 0 ON GRID

PEABODY, Sept. 12 — Marblehead's Red Devils, playing in mid season style at Leo Buckley Stadium this afternoon, outplayed Peabody throughout the game to win 20 to 0 victory before 7000 grid ns.

It was late in the first period that first touchdown was scored. After arching down the field on rushes an Sullivan, Marblehead quarterback smashed from the 10-yard line.

In the second period on a 25-yard pass from midfield, Chapman to Charles Kelley, the second touchdown was registered without opposition from the Peabody players. Brady kicked from placement for the extra point.

In the third period Frank Pierce, Peabody quarterback, took the ball for three first downs to bring the play to the Marblehead 17-yard line, this being the only time during the game that the Headers were threatened.

In the final period Dave Larkin, Marblehead fullback, took the ball over for a touchdown on a 10-yard end run. Larkin likewise scored the extra point from placement.

Sullivan Gives Headers Win Over Amesbury

AMESBURY, Sept. 26—For the third successive week Marblehead High's magic makers kept their goal line uncrossed while defeating Amesbury, 6 to 0, in Landry Memorial Stadium this afternoon, but the haughty seacoasters were given the stiffest kind of opposition by an Amesbury defense that refused to crack.

Marblehead's lone touchdown came in the second quarter when little Danny Sullivan plunged through right guard from the one-yard line. Amesbury blocked the placement attempt to convert.

CHAPMAN, BARRY HELD HEADERS

Although clearly outplaying Amesbury, George Moriarty's Yachtsmen had to earn every inch of ground gained as the Amesbury team, keyed up to this contest, closed the latch on the Headers' bag of tricks. While unable to gain with straight running plays, Marblehead made good use of its overhead game. Speedsters Ed Barry and Jack Chapman also ripped off several substantial gains around Amesbury's flanks.

It was a Barry-to-Sullivan short pass, with the latter running a dozen yards, that put the Moriarty men in scoring position. Sullivan did some fancy running to reach the Amesbury 14, from where Dave Larkin, Barry and Chapman alternated in working the leather to the one-yard stripe.

Marblehead was denied on four other occasions. Dick Alenty, punting beautifully all afternoon, kept Amesbury out of trouble several times. One of his punts carried 68 yards. Defensively, Bill Lucier, a sophomore end, did a bang up job of stopping Marblehead's trio of Larkin, Chapman and Barry.

Marblehead Takes Over Salem, 20-7

Wild Pass, Taken by Barry, Turns Tide in Second Period

SALEM, Oct. 3—Snatching a wild forward pass from John "Chipper" Chapman after it bounced out of the hands of left end Charlie Kelley and eluded the clutches of Salem's Johnnie Moran, Eddie Barry ran 35 yards for the touchdown that turned the tide as Marblehead High conquered Salem High, 20 to 7, before 6000 fans at Bertram Field today.

COMES LATE IN SECOND PERIOD

This heart-breaking touchdown came late in the second period like a bolt from the blue and broke a 7-7 tie. The Salem touchdown was its first of the season and it also was the first time the Marblehead goal line had been crossed.

Two fumbles marred the first three plays of the game, after the Salem kickoff. Salvi Zavaglia recovered Chapman's fumble and then on Salem's first down, Charlie Kelley of Marblehead recovered Ted Mielcarz's bobble on the Marblehead 45-yard stripe.

With Eddie Barry, Chapman and Dave Larkin carrying the mail, Marblehead advanced on three successive first downs to the Salem 11, but on fourth down, Barry fumbled and Walter Morz recovered.

Charlie Damanis kicked on fourth down, but Chapman brought the ball back to the Salem 27, and then made it a first down on the Salem nine as the period ended. On the first play, Chapman went off his own left tackle for the touchdown, and Dave Larkin kicked the point.

AND THAT TIED THE SCORE

Salem then put on the pressure, and a long forward, Damanis to Johnny Moran, brought the ball to the Marblehead 2-yard line, with Chapman, the safety man, preventing a touchdown. Marblehead then pushed Salem back to the 21-yard line, and on fourth down, Barry kicked to Salem's 29. Salem got its break at this point, when Bill Nolan recovered Barry's fumble. A third down forward pass, Damanis to Moran, reached Marblehead's eight, and another pass was snared by Moran just one yard inside the end zone. A Damanis to Nolan forward accounted for the point that tied up the game, 7 to 7.

Then came the "play for the book" that sent Marblehead into the lead. Moran's kickoff was taken by Chapman on the Marblehead 42, and on first down, Chapman stepped back and hurled a long forward that went off Kelley (Marblehead) to Moran (Salem) and thence to Barry (Marblehead). Larkin's attempted placement was blocked.

Salem staged a real drive in the third period but it petered out when Damanis' pass was intercepted by Barry on the Marblehead five. Nano Randazzo saved a touchdown by forcing Barry out of bounds on the Marblehead 45-yard line on the run-back.

Salem made what proved an "error of judgment" in the last play of the third period by failing to kick with the ball on its own five-yard line. The fourth period found Damanis being forced to kick into the wind, and Chapman ran the ball back from the Salem 45 to the 27-yard line. Two first downs placed the ball on the Salem six, but Salem's goal line stand was enough to take the ball away on the one-foot line. Chapman, however, took the Damanis kick on the 35-yard line and outspurred the Salem defenders to payoff territory. Dave Larkin place-kicked the 20th point of the game.

'Headers Still Unbeaten and Untied

Newburyport Fifth Victim On 26-6 Count

NEWBURYPORT, Oct. 10—Eddie Barry, fleet-footed Marblehead half-back, intercepted Jimmy Zafris' forward pass early in the opening period, sprinting 77 yards for a touchdown, to launch the Marblehead High Magicians on their way to a 26 to 6 victory over Newburyport High here this afternoon. It was the fifth straight road triumph for the undefeated and untied 'Headers.

Outstanding for Newburyport in defeat were Al Fuchs, the center, and "Lefty" Sumner Haley, forward-passer. Fuchs made four out of five tackles for his team in the early stages of the game. Haley's entrance in the fourth period gave Newburyport fans their big moment of the afternoon.

'HEADERS GRASP EARLY LEAD

The George Moriarty-coached team grasped every opportunity against a Newburyport eleven that played gamely with nary a break. It looked like a rout early in the game, for a second Marblehead touchdown came near the end of the first period. Bill Bray, Marblehead right guard, blocked Paul Twoomey's kick and recovered on the Newburyport 23-yard line. Barry made nine and Dave Larkin plunged to a first down on the 10. Barry then went off tackle to the five, and Chapman went through his own left tackle for the touchdown. Larkin kicked the point to wind up the period with Marblehead on top, 13 to 6.

The Headers dominated the play shortly after the second period opened forcing Twoomey to kick from his own 37. John "Chipper" Chapman caught it on the Marblehead 36 yard stripe, and ran it back to the Newburyport 40. Barry, behind fine blocking, made it a first down on the 28 yard stripe, and then on first down, circled his own left end for the third touchdown, with Larkin booting the extra point.

Marblehead's final touchdown came near the end of the third period. The Headers took possession when Newburyport failed to gain two yards on the Marblehead 45 yard stripe. A 15 yard penalty for roughness gave Marblehead a first down on the Newburyport 35, and a Chapman to Gene Girourd pass brought the ball nine yards from the goal. Barry reached the three and then the one on two pushes, and Johnny Larkin, substitute back, swept wide around his left end and dove over for the score.

Following the unsuccessful attempt for the extra point, there was a lively mixup. Fists flew and both squads rushed from the sidelines. It was quickly over when the coaches chased the belligerents back to the benches.

Newburyport's touchdown came shortly after the entrance of Sumner Haley, southpaw passer. He uncorked a pass to "Lib" Liberte that advanced the ball from midfield to the Marblehead 31, and then a Haley to Zafris pass from the Marblehead eight. Liberte plunged to the three and then Billy Brown bucked to the one, with Liberte going over on a plunge over the center of the line.

For the Joppa Towners, Al Fuchs and Haley were the stars, Fuchs made tackle after tackle early in the fray and was taken out in the second quarter in an almost exhausted condition. On his return in the fourth period, he again was brilliant.

SALEM BAFFLED BY 'HEAD BACKS IN GREAT GAME

A powerful Marblehead offense and an amazing exhibition of T-formation plays gave a strong but inexperienced Salem eleven a 20 to 7 trouncing at Bertram Field last Saturday afternoon before 4,000 excited grid fans.

Like the Magicians they are the young Moriarty huskies got behind the Salem lines almost at will, roaming around the Salem backfield in the wake of deceptive plays that the Salem lads could not figure out, and making gain after gain.

So Johnny Larkin, who was looking for a spot to break into, stepped into his brother's vacated fullback job and the team has gone on its merry unbeaten pace to occupy a place right behind undefeated, untied Melrose High in the race for the state class B championship.

The sad note about this team is that only a comparatively few home fans have seen it compile its season's record of nine wins and one tie to date. The home field, Joel Reynolds Park, otherwise known as the Green street grounds, has deteriorated into a bog. Consequently Marblehead has had to play its games away from home, all of them except a game with Gloucester.
