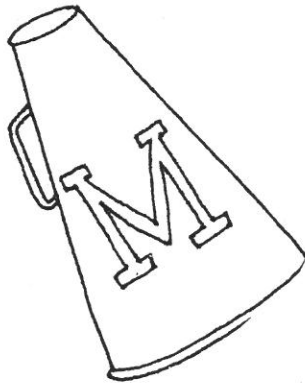

**Up-State Team Gave 'Headers
Hard Battle and Big Scare;
Winners Scored in Second
Half; Tansey Stars**

Marblehead High underrated Newburyport High yesterday. Newburyport High also underrated itself. In a hard fought game at the up-state city the southern county eleven won from the northerners by a score of 13 to 7. Newburyport presented a rather powerful looking team with a line that was pretty bulky in spots.

Newburyport took a 7 to 0 lead in the first half. The big advance that made the score possible was a 30-yard gain on a punt exchange. Newburyport punted and the Marbleheaders awaited for the ball to go over the line for a touchback so that play could be resumed on the 20-yard line. The ball stopped dead on the one-yard line and Marblehead punted out to about the 25-yard mark. From here by a series of rushes the Newburyport team scored a touchdown which was followed by a kicked goal giving the Newburyport team a 7 to 0 lead.

In the second half Marblehead won the game. Newburyport started a march down the field. Near midfield a ball snapped to one of the home team's backs, glanced off the hands of the man supposed to receive it. While the ball was hanging in the air Hunson of Marblehead seized it and raced up the field for a score. The try at the goal was missed.

A little later Marblehead blocked a kick and in a series of line plunges put the ball over, H. Eustis scoring. The goal try was true.

With a few minutes to play Newburyport pulled a bone. With three yards to go on the fourth down inside its own 20-yard line, Newburyport tried to buck its way to a first down. It was held and Marblehead got the ball near the score line. Newburyport held and on the fourth down Marblehead tried a forward pass. It was intercepted and advanced to midfield by a home player. Several men were injured in this play, including S. Eustis of Marblehead who was carried from the field apparently suffering intensely.

Ginsberg of Newburyport had a wrist broken during the play.

Tansey played a good all around game in the Marblehead backfield, being called upon more than any other man on the field with the possible exception of Carver of Newburyport.

Marblehead played a slightly better game than Newburyport, although outweighed. The 'Headers seemed to follow the ball a little more closely. Newburyport has a strong looking squad and should be heard from before the season is over. The summary:

Marblehead is pointed Salem way Saturday. As the Salem-Marblehead game draws near all indications point to one of the greatest of football crowds in the history of local football.

The Marblehead High football team won their third consecutive game when they defeated Newburyport High, a much heavier team at Newburyport yesterday afternoon, 13 to 7. In the first half the local boys were outplayed but in the second half they came back strong winning. They showed speed and endurance but a number of breaks enabled them to win. It was a break which allowed the Newburyport team to score. In a great sense the game was very satisfactory, showing that the boys can go up against a heavier team and win. Saturday's game with Salem is creating great interest and doubtless many hundreds of local fans will attend. The first league game at home will be played at Evans park next Tuesday.

**MARBLEHEAD TO
PLAY IN WEST**

The Marblehead High school football eleven, accompanied by Principal Campbell, Coach Pendleton, Field Manager Cox and Dr. Samuel C. Eveleth, will leave Marblehead, Thursday, Nov. 11 for nearly a week's Western trip, which will have as its purpose a return game at Maywood, Ill. on Saturday, Nov. 13, at 2 P.M. with Proviso High school.

The Proviso High eleven played Marblehead, coming East for an intersectional game last year, and at that time Marblehead authorities agreed upon the return game this season.

The trip will be one of the most extensive taken by a local eleven and will cost \$101 per man, exclusive of meals, which will bring the figure up to \$120 to reach of the 18 players and four others making the tour.

By arrangement made with the Western management it had guaranteed the Marbleheaders \$1800 expense money, but in view of increased transportation and other costs since arrangements were made this will not cover the trip and it is planned to raise an additional \$1000 by subscription at Marblehead.

The itinerary of the Marblehead pigskin chasers has been mapped out as follows: Leave Marblehead at 8 AM Thursday, Nov. 11. Leave Boston at 10 AM on the E. & A. Arrive in Chicago at 12.30 PM Friday.

Schoolboys Going to Chicago

The school committee held a meeting last night at which the plans for the football teams trip to Chicago were considered. Faculty Manager L. D. Cox has been over the matter and it has been reckoned out to a nicety what the expense for each member of the party will be. It is planned to take along 18 or 20 players besides Coach Pendleton, Mr. Cox, G. P. Campbell and Dr. Samuel C. Eveleth, who will look after the health of the boys on the trip. The minimum cost for the round trip, not including meals, will be \$101 for each person. This includes a Pullman berth. It is estimated that the minimum expense, including meals, will be about \$120.

The trip will be a great source of education for the boys as they will

not only have an opportunity of seeing the great western city of Chicago, but on their return trip they will visit Niagara Falls and other points of interest. The guarantee to the team by the Proviso High is \$1800, but as the expenses will be larger than last year owing to the rise in railroad rates, the committee have asked for an additional \$175, but have not yet received any response. It will be necessary to raise \$1000 for the expenses of the party, and this amount will be raised by entertainments and also public subscription. Following is the schedule worked out:

The party will leave Marblehead at 8 on the morning of Nov. 11 and will leave Boston over the Boston & Albany railroad at 10, arriving in Chicago, Friday at 12:30 p. m. The game with Proviso high will be played at Maywood at 3 p. m., Saturday, Nov. 13. The team will be

entertained the remainder of Saturday and Sunday, leaving Chicago for home Sunday evening at 8.

They will arrive at Niagara at 10 a. m., where the day will be spent in sightseeing and the final stage of the journey will be made from Buffalo at 8 p. m. The party will arrive in Boston at 10:55, Tuesday, Nov. 10. The entire trip will take six days and the boys are looking forward to it with great enthusiasm. It is expected that a number of fans will accompany the team making a good sized party. That the boys will be royally entertained by the western people goes without saying.

INTENSE INTEREST SHOWN.

An event which the local sport followers are eagerly awaiting is the gridiron combat between the Marblehead High school team and the Salem High outfit to be staged at Bertram field, Salem, tomorrow afternoon. Interest in this approaching contest is of a most ardent kind and is widely prevalent in this town.

It is the general opinion that the number of persons who attend this game from this town will be as large as that which will be present from here at the Marblehead High-Swampscott next Thanksgiving Day. An unmistakable atmosphere of confidence pervades Marblehead respecting the outcome of tomorrow afternoon's battle.

Salem and Marblehead Make Shifts on the Eve of Game

Football Teams Rearrange Line-Ups; Wentworth in Game for Salem; Locals Hold Secret Session This Afternoon

On the eve of their greatest football duel Salem High and Marblehead High have made important shifts in their lineups. The shifts are due to the loss of players through injuries.

Officials Picked

It looked for a time as though the schools might break over the choice of officials. This matter has been settled amicably and there is now nothing in the way. A clear day Saturday will see at Bertram field a crowd that will rival and possibly surpass any gathering that ever attended a Salem High school athletic contest.

Both sides are confident. Both will fight to the end of the game. The loss of the contest will be a bitter blow to the Salem eleven. Marblehead is even more anxious to win than Salem. Facing a new eleven on its own grounds before a great outpouring this is undoubtedly one of Marblehead High's greatest chances. Above and beyond that Marblehead High goes to Illinois to play Proviso High at Maywood a month hence. The travelers are anxious to go to the Middle West with a clean slate. A defeat at the hands of Salem will be a hard blow at the prestige of the ambitious crimson eleven from the next town to the south.

Both Teams Numbered

There is apt to be some confusion at the game Saturday, not so much affecting the players as the spectators. Both elevens wear the same color in jerseys, red. Both teams are numbered. In the mixup it is going to be difficult to distinguish the players.

It appears that Salem will have an advantage in weight over Marblehead. Marblehead is said to average in weight 136 pounds. Salem will go somewhat above this.

Important shifts have been made in the lineups. Marblehead may at the last minute send into action the same team that beat Newburyport Wednesday. However there is a chance that Captain Gilbert and Tackle S. Eustis may be replaced. Both attended the practice session yesterday but are still feeling the bangs they received at Newburyport. If Eustis is out he will be replaced by Deliber. If Gilbert is out he will be replaced by Haskell or Caswell. If Caswell goes to the backfield Peach will take the vacancy at end.

Tackle Waite of Salem is out of the game. Ulrich will take a tackle place Saturday. Fish will take the other tackle position and Wyman, the tall sophomore, will go to left guard. Fish has been playing a great game at guard and for that reason will be given a place at tackle.

Captain Wentworth was in the scrimmage yesterday little the worse for the game last week. He ran wild about the field until relieved. Much will depend on him tomorrow. Salem will use the regular backfield

that has been in action together in the first two games.

The fence around Bertram field is practically completed and will be entirely reconstructed by tonight. The lines have been moved back from the playing field giving the players more leeway at the sidelines so as to avoid colliding with the posts.

Today's practice session at Bertram field will be a secret session. This secret practice will be open to Salemites who are known at the field. Those who have been following the team will be admitted but all strangers or suspicious looking people will be charged with being in league with Marblehead and will be forthwith cast into exterior darkness. Marbleheaders are welcome at Bertram field on Saturday. But those local followers who have been attending the practice sessions will be admitted as usual.

The length of the game has not been decided. Coach McDevitt believes in distance. He will probably suggest 15-minute periods as he did in almost every game in 1913 when he first came here. Marblehead is expected to stand firm for a shorter game. The argument will probably be compromised satisfactorily.

As the field is closed those who go to the game Saturday are urged to purchase tickets on the way to the field. They will be on sale along the roads leading in, and congestion at the gate will be eliminated if people buy tickets before they get to the ticket office. The front of the grandstand on the Salem side will be kept clear. This is done so that those sitting on the lower seats of the stand will be able to see the game. A little cove in the field will thus be formed. This cove will be the headquarters of the local eleven.

Both teams enter the game undefeated. Each team has many strong reasons for winning. It will be a fight to a finish in a sportsmanlike battle. Both teams have played cleanly this fall and while a noisy game is anticipated there is little question but that the contest will be a hard one. The line-ups:

Arranging for High School Football Team to Go to Chicago; Okas O'Brien Brockton; Town Notes

Marblehead, Oct. 8.—The school committee last night made the following arrangements in regard to the trip to Chicago by the Marblehead High school football team to play the return game with Proviso High in the Windy city. Marblehead High will leave Marblehead Thursday morning, November 11, at 8 o'clock, and leave Boston over the Boston & Albany railroad at 10 A. M. and arrive in Chicago Friday, November 12, at 12.30 P. M. Will play at Maywood Saturday afternoon, November 13, at 3 P. M. The team will leave Chicago for home at 8 P. M. Sunday evening and arrive at Niagara Falls at 10 A. M. Monday morning; leave Buffalo at 10 P. M. Monday night and arrive in Boston at 10.55 A. M. on Tuesday morning.

The railroad fare, exclusive of meals, will be \$101, and the minimum including meals will be \$120. The agreement was made last year that the Chicago management should send \$1800 to pay expenses of the team but on account of the increase of railroad transportation the committee will ask for \$175 more from Chicago. It is also proposed to raise \$1000 in Marblehead to help pay other expenses of the team and this money will be raised by subscriptions, dances and other forms of entertainments. The party will consist of 18 or 20 members of the football team, Dr. Samuel C. Eveleth, chairman of the school committee, Coach Ray Pendleton, Faculty Manager L. Prescott Cox and George P. Campbell, principal of the Marblehead High school.

EVENLY MATCHED

Marblehead and Salem strove valiantly upon the gridiron at Witchburgh yesterday and when the final whistle blew, honors were even at 7-7. Despite the hot weather both teams put up a great game, Marblehead showing considerable dash that stamps them as one of the teams to be feared in the North Shore League.

Marblehead scored in the second period. After an exchange of kicks, Wentworth the Salem captain kicked one that went inside of his own 30 yard line as he stood behind the uprights. Marblehead then worked a short forward pass to Hunson just over the line and he romped to the five yard mark before brought down.

One line play failed but on the next rush Sweetland found a hole and carried the pigskin over. Tansey kicked the goal and it was well for Marblehead would have tasted defeat.

Soon after Marblehead punted to Fallon, who muffed on his own 17 yard line. Marblehead then fumbled and Salem recovered on the 15 yard chalk. Capt. Wentworth of Salem slid off the tackle, shook off four men, and sprinted 85 yards for a touchdown.

His goal that tied it up was only a foot inside the right post and just barely cleared the bar.

Crowd of 4000 Sees Great Salem-Marblehead Football Duel End in a 7 to 7 Tie

Salem Saved From Defeat in Spectacular Game as Wentworth Dashes 85 Yards for Touchdown and Kicks Goal

That in brief is the summary of Saturday's sensational gridiron duel at Bertram field. It tells the result but it does not tell the story of the ebb and flow of football fortunes that continually threatened both sides with defeat in a brilliant conflict.

A crowd of 4000 people watched the game as crowds seldom watch games. For the developments of the contest were such that momentarily it was expected that something would happen that would turn the tide. Both touchdowns were made in the second period.

Marblehead was the first to score, Sweetland carrying the ball through Salem's right side for a touchdown as the Marblehead side of the field went into a frenzy. Tansey put victory for Salem a little farther away by booting the ball beautifully between the uprights, making the score 7 to 0 against the local eleven.

It was only a few minutes later that Captain Wentworth of Salem, standing just a few yards in front of his own goal posts, broke away from the scrimmage and dashed down the field for a touchdown. He then tied the game by driving the ball one foot inside the right post at the east end of the field. That ended the scoring. Anxiously both sides then waited for a decision, but it did not come. Both sides of the field, intensely partisan, were dissatisfied. The school football season of 1920 will not come to a satisfactory end until these teams have met once more in a decisive battle.

Marblehead sent into the game all its regulars. The players all wore sweat shirts to distinguish the Head players from Salem. Salem presented a slightly changed lineup. Fallon went to quarter and Chaurette to right half. Callahan was out of the game at the start. Farley replaced Wyman in the line.

The game was marked by an unusual number of fumbles. This was due undoubtedly to the new ball. The players during the week had been practicing with used footballs which spread somewhat and are more easily handled. A new ball is slippery.

Marblehead kicked to Chaurette, who ran the ball back to Salem's 40-yard line. Salem at once made a first down but the defence of the Head team was so strong that all visions of an easy victory for Salem disappeared. Marblehead held and Salem punted. The kick was blocked but was recovered by Wentworth. Salem then fumbled and it was Marblehead's ball on Salem's 36-yard line. Caswell was knocked unconscious by a blow on the back of the head. He was relieved by Peach.

A forward pass, a short lateral pass over right end, gave Marblehead a first down on Salem's 20-yard line. Marblehead was penalized for offside play, Salem held and Tansey tried for a field goal from the 30-yard line. It went wide. Salem took the ball on its own 20-yard line. Salem was held and had to punt. The Marblehead forwards were getting in on Wentworth and his kicks were hurried and short. A criss-cross play was stopped for a loss to Marblehead. Marblehead was then penalized for starting ahead of the ball. Marblehead kicked to Fallon who was downed on his five-yard line by Peach, the only red jersey player of the Head team. One play by Salem failed to gain but it brought the ball away from the posts for a kick. Again Wentworth punted and his kick being hurried it fell short and returned to Salem's 28-yard line where the period ended.

Salem then defended the West goal line. On the first play Hunson took a short forward pass over right end and ran to Salem's five-yard line. One play at centre was stopped and then Sweetland carried the ball through his left side for a score. Tansey kicked the goal and Marblehead sent up a racket that was heard all over the district.

Marblehead kicked to Fallon who returned the ball 22 yards before being downed. Salem was held up and Wentworth got away a long punt. Salem held and Marblehead punted. Fallon fumbled the punt as he was tackled on Salem's 17-yard line. Marblehead recovered the ball and immediately fumbled. Salem recovered.

Wentworth Gets Away

Then it happened. Wentworth took the ball and slid through Marblehead's right side. He shook off two men that grabbed him and was clear of the line. He outraced another Marbleheader who was coming across the field for him. Then he was clear. With the whole Marblehead team at his heels Wentworth raced down the side of the field and planted the ball behind the Marblehead line. He had run 85 yards for a touchdown. As they say on all occasions of this kind, "Pandemonium broke loose" on the Salem side and for a long time they cheered Wentworth. But Marblehead was still leading 7 to 6. Wentworth set the ball and booted it. It sailed one foot inside the upright and the score was 7 to 7.

Here Fallon was replaced. Chaurette went to quarter and Callahan to right half. There was little doing for the rest of this period. Wentworth got away once for 15 yards and nearly got clear. The half ended with the score 7 to 7.

In the third period, Salem kicked to J. Eustis who made a short return run. Tansey went back to kick. His kick was blocked and it was Salem's ball on Marblehead's 30-yard line. Then Chaurette fumbled. Wentworth intercepted a forward pass on Salem's 40 mark. Salem kicked. Marblehead rushed the ball for a first down. A forward pass failed. Marblehead kicked to Callahan who was downed where he stood. Wentworth made 12 yards at left end. Marblehead was penalized 15 yards for illegal entry on the field of play. With the ball well into Marblehead's territory again Salem tumbled. Period over.

Marblehead kicked to Chaurette who advanced the ball till tackled when he fumbled. Salem then recovered a Marblehead fumble. Salem was held and Wentworth drove a 55-yard punt to Marblehead's 23-yard line. Tansey made 15 yards. Tansey fumbled and Belanger got the ball. Wentworth's long kick sailed over the heads of the defenders. The ball rolled toward the goal line. There is a difference of opinion as to what happened here. Rosenthal, claiming that the ball was a free ball because it bounded off a Marblehead player's shoe, picked up the ball and dove over the line with it. Head Linesman Crowley said the ball was not touched and called it a touchback. Play was resumed on the 20-yard line. Rosenthal said after the game that the Marblehead player admitted that the ball had touched him. In that case it should have been a touchdown. The officials ruled against it and play went on at the 20-yard line. After that there was no threat of a score. Tansey got away for a

couple of good gains but time was soon called and the game ended in a tie, 7 to 7.

Marblehead High is coming over to Meadow Park, Saturday, filled with the rancor of fighting spirit and it behooves Lynn English to be prepared or there will be plenty of woe in this city before sundown ends what promises to be a hard fought gridiron battle.

HEADERS FIGHT

Coach Ray Pendleton is doing a nice job with those Headers who have a big incentive to fight because of the trip to Chicago, Nov. 11, when Marblehead fulfills its return date scheduled last year, with Proviso High of Maywood, Ill.

Pendleton allowed the first string men, who were in the Winthrop 7-7 game of the holiday to rest their weary young bones yesterday, while the second and third elevens roughed it upon the Evans park sod. Light But Speedy

ber of inexperienced men and outside of Harris, Capt. Art Ray, Young, Phaneuf and one or two others, many of the young warriors are novices.

Harris proved a wonderful ground gainer in the Saugus game, but whether he can get around Marblehead's ends remains to be seen unless the interference strikes harder than against Saugus.

English was beaten 2-0 at Gloucester by a safety touchdown, whereas Marblehead cleaned up the Fish-towners something like 22-0 which is a vast difference that shows that the Headers have offensive strength which as yet has not been fully developed by the Red and Gray.

Comparative scores may not tell the whole story, however and this gives Coach Sexton, Capt. Art Ray and the squad high hopes that the old time English punch will be manifested Saturday.

League Football

The entire North Shore league will be in action. Coach Joyce leads Classical at Revere and it should be a victory for the Red and White judging from the performances of the two teams. Joyce is working out several new plays and is going slowly because he feels that developing full strength now might put a crimp into his championship chances.

In Art Rogers he has already developed a brainy, fast working quarterback and is now building up a line to go along with his great backfield.

Swampscott is scheduled for Gloucester and Coach White should come away with a victory. This game will be interesting to compare scores made by Marblehead, English and Swampscott for North Shore league dopesters.

Peabody is travelling over to Winthrop for the week-end. Classical has already taken Manter's team and Marblehead held Winthrop to a 7-7 tie, Tuesday, after but a short rest from the strenuous 7-7 draw with Salem, Saturday.

DESPERATE BATTLE

HEAD DIVIDES IN RIVAL CAMP ON SUSPENSION

Dismissal of Tansey and Sweetland Causes Wide Disposition of Sentiment Among Followers of the Eleven

The action of Coach Ray Pendleton of the Marblehead High school football team in suspending Players Tansey and Sweetland on the eve of the game with Lynn Classical has divided Marblehead into two hostile football camps. It is claimed that the action taken was too severe in that it robbed Marblehead of two of its best players on the eve of the game, the loss of which deprives Marblehead of all chance for the North Shore league title and sends the Headers Westward next week with a battered record for the season.

Joe Tansey, one of the suspended backs, has been playing a sensational game this year. Besides being a good defensive man he was the driving power of the Marblehead backfield. He can kick, throw forward passes and carries the ball better than any other player on the team. Sweetland is generally rated as the next best thing to Tansey in the Marblehead array.

As far as coach Pendleton's action is of a disciplinary nature little fault can be found. The boys are charged with smoking cigarettes while members of the eleven, a very bad practice for a man playing football. However it is claimed that to some extent outside influence may have prevailed to the extent of putting Tansey and Sweetland off the team. It is claimed that the boys admitted their guilt on Thursday and were allowed on the field to practice Friday after which they were told of the suspension.

Somebody "told" on these two players. The players, when confronted with the charge by the coach, admitted that they had been smoking. It is suspected that there were others but the accused players admitted no guilt but their own. Such is the case against the boys as stated by their friends.

The suspension very evidently does not meet with general approval in Marblehead. It is claimed there that disciplinary action could have been taken along other lines. It is said to be the first offence against the rules that these boys have committed. It is conceded that some penalty should be inflicted for the breach of training regulations but it is claimed that the boys could have been penalized by extra work on the field or elsewhere. In this way the boys could be punished without wrecking the championship hopes of the team. The loss of these two backfield men has had its effect on the morale of the team. Steve Eustis, Marblehead's best lineman, was quite sympathetic with the plight of the suspended players. Then to make matters worse Eustis sustained an injury in the last game of Saturday which puts him out of football for the rest of the season.

HEADERS IN BAD
Marblehead is shot to pieces in the North Shore league. S. Eustis, tackle, was yesterday put out permanently for the season with a broken leg. Two other stars are also out for a while because of other reasons. It is alleged that they broke training and are being disciplined by Coach Pendleton, whose stand is earning the commendations of the entire town for Marblehead will not tolerate disloyalty.

"We have formulated no plans for any of the remaining time of our visit except, of course, we know what we are going to do Saturday afternoon.

"Our plans call for our leaving Chicago via the Michigan Central at 8 p. m. Sunday, arriving at Niagara Falls at 8:10 a. m. the following morning. Here we shall spend the forenoon, going to Buffalo after lunch, where we intend to see as much as time allows. Leaving Buffalo at 10:15 Monday evening, we arrive at the 'Land of the Braves and Home of the Beans' at 10:55 Tuesday morning and at Marblehead about one hour later—just a little too late to think of attending school until Wednesday.

"We shall be accompanied by our big 'Steve,' who will be carrying his left leg in a cast, the result of Saturday's game with Classical High School of Lynn. Eustis was perhaps our best lineman and his loss is sure to be felt, but we offer no excuses. We shall have, however, twenty-two or more uniformed players in addition to Steve and the 'dignitaries.'

"Here's wishing you success in your big undertaking.

Plans for their reception and for their entertainment while they are the guests of Proviso were perfected at a meeting of the representatives of the business men of Proviso held recently at the high school. These plans follow:

The boys are to be met at the train by a delegation from Proviso and taken over to the City club for lunch. From there every one will drive to Maywood, where the eastern team will hunker up after their long trip. While they are here they will have headquarters at one of the seminary dormitories, which is placed at their disposal through the courtesy of Dr. E. F. Krauss.

Of course nothing has been planned for Saturday forenoon. The rest of the day, however, will be crowded. As

soon as the players can get ready after the game, a banquet will be served at the high school. Eighty or more will be present, including the Marblehead party, Proviso's first and second teams, the Board of Education, members of the faculty, and a few of the men on the various committees.

Following closely after the banquet comes the dance, in charge of the Alumni. Husk O'Hara's orchestra has been engaged for this occasion. The football squads will be guests of honor. One hundred twenty-five tickets are available for high school students, and alumni will make up most of the rest of the company. In order to keep the floor clear for the dancers, spectators will be asked to remain in the gallery.

A tour of the south side boulevard system, including a glimpse of the University of Chicago, will be taken Sunday morning, ending with luncheon at the Chicago Motor club. This trip will be taken only by the visiting men. In the afternoon, however, both squads will go for a spin along the north side boulevards, getting a view of Northwestern University and other places of interest. Then they will go to the Illinois Athletic club, where a dinner will be served. The visitors will start on their homeward trip at 8 p. m.

The American Legion is in charge of ushering at the game Saturday. The Proviso Letter Men's association will attend in a body and occupy a table reserved for them. The Juniors will have charge of all procession, and handling the money. The Maywood Community club will decorate the bleachers and stands, and Madison street from Greenwood avenue to Fifth avenue. CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—The Marblehead (Mass.) high school squad of 23 players reached here today to do battle with the Proviso high school team tomorrow for the \$35-pound intersectional championship. Last year the eastern team defeated the western lads, 6 to 3, at Marblehead.

Tomorrow afternoon 11 Marblehead boys and perhaps a greater number will strive on the gridiron at Maywood, Ill., to bring glory to the local High school and unbounded joy to the people of this town by defeating Proviso High of Maywood, Ill. in a contest to determine the lightweight championship of America.

MARBLEHEAD IS NOSED OUT IN CHI

Proviso's Last Minute Rush Breaks Tie—Score, 14-7

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Two minutes of whirlwind football by the Proviso team in the last half of the fourth period proved the undoing of Marblehead in their inter-sectional game this afternoon and what seemed a sure tie game was turned into a victory for the westerners, 14 to 7. Coach "Bud" Barry played a lucky hunch when he substituted Warren for Coate just as the game was drawing to a close and the entire Proviso team took on a new lease of life the moment Warren started playing.

Just before the final whistle blew Warren startled the 5000 rooters who filled the stands at the Maywood Field by dashing 40 yards past the entire team for a touchdown, breaking a tie which had existed from early in the first half.

Capt. Gilbert was the outstanding star for the visitors with a beautiful 60-yard run that evened matters up. Gilbert was badly battered near the end of the game and had to retire. Tansey also starred for the visitors.

A 30-yard run by Tansey brought the ball from the shadow of Proviso's goal to nearly the centre of the field, from where Gilbert made his dash on the very next play for Marblehead's only score.

Proviso High Wins Game in Last Period at Maywood, Illinois

MAYWOOD, Ill., Nov. 13.—Proviso High was one touchdown better than Marblehead here today in the presence of a big crowd that gathered to see an East vs West gridiron battle for the 135 lb. schoolboy national title: Before the struggle Marblehead was champion but this crown of glory disappeared in the last quarter when Warren broke through for a touchdown breaking the tie. The final count favored the Westerners 14-7.

Marblehead put up a desperate fight all the distance and Coach Pendleton's youthful warriors demonstrated their gameness on a foreign field, far from home and in a town where football has been the subject of all conversation for many a day.

A fumble gave Proviso its first chance to score in the opening period. H. Eustis fumbled a punt on his own 10 yard line and Proviso's backs started slam banging their way until Dunk went over through a line play and Follette kicked the extra point over the bar.

But Marblehead came back and evened matters in the second quarter when Tansey pulled a 45 yard run and Gilbert followed it with another of 45 more by great dodging through a broken field until he had worked himself clear. Marblehead's interference was superb and tackler after tackler's was put out of play.

Tansey kicked the goal and the count was tied.

Tansey attempted two field goals in the opening stages of the contest but they failed.

In the third quarter the leather alternated frequently with the play mostly in Marblehead territory.

Tansey intercepted a forward pass for a 35 run to Proviso's 28 yard line in the fourth but Marblehead could not gain. His field goal was blocked but he recovered and as the Westerners plugged up all holes in their line and vigilantly guarded their wings, he essayed another but it also failed.

It looked like a tie score just then but the break came soon after when Proviso gained possession of the oval on Marblehead's 38 yard line. Warren broke through, eluded the secondary defence and raced for the touchdown that gave the West victory and brought the title back to Maywood.

Marblehead Ties Peabody

Schoolboys Play Great Game at Evans Park Before 5000 Fans.

With the ball on Peabody's one-yard line, Marblehead failed to put over the touchdown that would have given it a victory over the Tanners in one of the greatest high school gridiron battles ever played in Essex county Saturday at Evans field, Marblehead. Four times, the light Marblehead combination bucked the Peabody line, but after the last attempt the pigskin rested one scant foot from the final white line. The last ditch stand by the Peabody team came in the last few minutes of play of the final quarter. The game resulted in a 7 to 7 tie, but holding the Peabody stalwarts on even terms was equivalent to a Marblehead victory, as the Tanners had been picked to win by at least two touchdowns over the Head aggregation.

Two "breaks" were responsible for the touchdowns. Joe Tansey kicked off to Peabody, but O'Connor and Munroe collided in going after the ball and Martin recovered. It was Marblehead's ball on the 20-yard line. A pretty forward pass, Howard Eustis to Gilbert, placed the ball on the Peabody four-yard line. Eustis made three yards, and then placed the ball over the Peabody goal line on a plunge. Tansey kicked the goal.

The second break went Peabody's way near the close of the period. Peabody had rushed the ball to the

but lost the ball on downs. Kicking from under his own goal posts, Tansey of Marblehead hurried the punt. It hit one of his own men, and the ball fell into Lawrence's arms. Lynch went over in two bucks, and Holden tied the score with a goal after touchdown.

Play was mostly in Marblehead territory in the second period, with the play see-sawing back and forth. The half ended with the ball in Marblehead's possession on its own 43-yard line.

Marblehead played Peabody hard in the third and fourth periods. Penalties for hold cost Peabody 45 yards in plays, and Marblehead used the forward pass to advantage.

The feature play of the game came in the final period. With the ball in midfield, Tansey shot a long forward and Caswell caught the ball on the run. He eluded O'Connor, the final Peabody tackler, but the latter made a pretty tackle from behind and Caswell was downed on the Peabody 12-yard line. Caswell had made 50 yards on the play. The Headers made first down, but were stopped one foot from the Peabody goal line. O'Connor kicked the ball out of danger, and Tansey rushed it back to the Marblehead 30-yard line. On the first down, Tansey attempted the field goal, but Peabody broke in and blocked the attempt, and the game was over.

Standing out as one of the stars in the game was Martin, the Marblehead centre. The youngster showed fine football sense, and was every play. Sweetland's tackling and Tansey's work on the offense were bright features, while O'Connor and Lynch excelled for the Tanners. The score:
