

Memorable McGuinness coaching era started 50 years ago at M'head

Fifty years ago marked the beginning of the coaching era which brought to Marblehead High the nickname "Magicians." Charlie McGuinness came from Abington to coach at Marblehead in 1930, and if it were not for his expenditure of \$5 to Pop Warner for the great Temple University football coach's book on football, Marblehead's teams would probably never have been known by their now famous nickname.

McGuinness was a Northwesterner, a graduate of the University of Washington where he was a member of a championship crew team.

In the late 1920s, McGuinness was being considered as a crew coach at a leading university in the eastern part of the country. The job never materialized and he found himself 3,000 miles away from home without a job.

McGuinness consulted a teachers' employment agency and learned of a teaching vacancy at Natick High School. In that depression year, he had to take whatever job he could get. He had a chance to coach there, although he had no experience. His crew team membership at the University of Washington kept him from playing football, basketball or baseball in college.

The young man who had come East decided to accept the challenge. He was aware he needed to study up on football with the gridiron season at Natick fast approaching. He sent \$5 to Pop Warner for Warner's book on football. He studied the book for hours, the way a serious student would study for an approaching final exam.

McGuinness also talked with many leading football men. He enjoyed success in his time at Natick, then coached briefly at Abington where he was likewise successful.

Through someone employed in the Abington school system, McGuinness became known in Marblehead.

Stan Burnham was the coach of Marblehead High football in 1929, and had a creditable 4-3-3 record for that season, including a 19-6 win over Swampscott. Burnham, however, was rumored to be about to end his coaching duties.

The story goes that Dr. Samuel Eveleth, Marblehead squad physician as well as a Marblehead school committee member at the time, inquired of an official at one of Marblehead's 1929 football game if he knew of any successful football coach whom Marblehead might obtain for the following season. The official was Charlie Frolio who for many years was principal at Abington High School. Frolio mentioned a coach at his own school, Charlie McGuinness, who was enjoying much success.

That conversation set in motion the wheels for bringing McGuinness to Marblehead in 1930 as both a teacher and a coach of football, basketball and baseball.

As a result of an extensive study of Pop Warner's material on football, plus his consultation with experts on the sport, McGuinness installed a highly deceptive attack at Marblehead which is still remembered by veteran North Shore football fans.

Football at the time was in the days when a forward pass had to be thrown from at least five yards behind the line of scrimmage. The modern form of the T-formation, with a man in motion, was still 10 years into the future.

McGuinness usually used a double wingback formation. Each halfback was stationed diagonally behind, and a little outside of, an end. The fullback was the deep back, a few yards behind the line of scrimmage, while the quarterback, unlike today's football, set up behind a lineman next to the center.

The line, in the McGuinness offense, was usually unbalanced to the left or the right. Each wingback faced slightly toward the interior of the line. The ball was snapped either to the quarterback or the fullback, and just about every play involved considerable deception in the Marblehead backfield.

McGuinness had a successful opening season with a 5-3-1 record. His assistant was Packy Garvey, a Natick native, who had assisted McGuinness in that town a few years earlier.

Marblehead played all its home games under McGuinness at the Green Street playground, which also became known as Joel Reynolds stadium. The field, according to newspaper accounts, was also being used in 1929, but the 1929 game with Swampscott was played at Seaside Park, which a short time earlier had been used regularly as Marblehead's home field. Under McGuinness, Seaside Park was the squad's practice field.

A brief look at the McGuinness years:

1930

Despite only three starters back, the 1930 season began on a winning note with a 7-0 victory over Winthrop, and ended with a rousing 26-0 triumph over Swampscott on Thanksgiving... Among the games was a 7-7 tie with undefeated Newburyport. The Clippers were coached by the late Del Borah, and during the McGuinness era, the Headers would never defeat a Borah-coached Newburyport team.... John McHugh, Daynor Prince, Auvie Putnam, and Pearson Hussey scored touchdowns against Swampscott. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1931

The Headers suffered the first of two losing seasons under McGuinness when they finished at 5-7-1 despite a 73-0 rout of Rockport on opening day. Prince, Franklin Clark, Jack Goodwin, Mitto Glover, Tabby Glass, Phil Wade, and Walter Fader all scored TD's in that impressive start...The season, however, would see shutout losses to Peabody, Classical, and Newburyport... Marblehead and Swampscott played to a 6-6 tie as quarterback Tom Pontililo scored the only TD. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1932

Marblehead closed at 4-5-2...A strong Charlie Vye-coached Danvers team did a 25-0 number on the Headers, Peabody beat them, 20-6, and Lynn Classical breezed, 19-0....Game with Newburyport ended in a 0-0 tie with the Headers on the Clipper one as time expired...Glover's touchdown gave Marblehead a 6-0 victory over Swampscott. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1933

An impressive first-ever 12-0 victory at Winthrop began a successful 7-3 campaign. Lyndsey, Brackett, and Messinger scored TDs....The Headers also spoiled the debut of Gloucester coach Nate Ross, 19-6. Ross went on to coach the Fishermen for 30 years...There was a big 33-2 victory over Saugus and then a 13-6 win over Swampscott. Brackett and Glover were the touchdown scorers. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1934

A banner season for Marblehead, an 8-1-1 record, the only loss a 2-0 setback to Salem. Salem's Stan Wydra tackled John Cudihy in the end zone for the only score...A flap over officials at Asesbury led to McGuinness demanding that the Amesbury game be cancelled. McGuinness lost the argument, but the Headers won easily, 35-0, as Dick Wells scored three touchdowns...The Newburyport game ended in a scoreless tie, a game in which McGuinness contended the Newburyport fire department hosed down the field to make the conditions muddy and slow the down the fleet M'Head backs... Previously unbeaten Beverly fell, 39-0, before 10,000 fans, and Marblehead coasted over Swampscott, 38-7, as Glover scored three times. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1935

A new assistant coach, Trem Robarts, came on the scene, as Marblehead posted an 8-1-2 record...The first team to play against Salem at refurbished Bertram Field, the Headers went down by a 7-0 count. Salem sophomore Stan Eusko scored the game's only touchdown...The Headers would later swamp Amesbury, 73-0, and roll up 526 yards in a 25-7 rout of Gloucester...Messinger scored four TD's in 33-7 win over Swampscott. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1936

The team's 8-4-1 record included two post-season losses in Florida...Among the losses was a 7-0 setback to Peabody which came into the game at 1-6-2...For the fourth straight year, however, Marblehead shut out Danvers, winning by a 14-0 count...Stacey Clark scored both touchdowns. Clark also had three scores in a 32-6 destruction of Newburyport...Hazell's two TD's beat Swampscott, 14-0. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1937

Team physician Dr. Samuel Eveleth retired after the 1936 season to be replaced by Dr. Stanford Hopkins, who would hold the post for the next 40 years... Team finished at 6-3-1 with victories over Winchester, Newburyport, Salem, Danvers, Amesbury, and Beverly... Marblehead and Swampscott played to a scoreless tie. The Thanksgiving lineup:

1938

A 7-3 record for McGuinness in his final season, highlighted by a 55-0 clobbering of Newburyport. Bud Keenan scored three touchdowns and Bruce Remick two...Danvers was shut out again, 6-0; Beverly fell, 13-6; and Swampscott was routed, 21-0, to close the season... Marblehead won its fourth Northeastern Conference title in the five-year existence of the league. The Thanksgiving lineup:

Under McGuinness, Marblehead had a colorful history of post-season and out-of-town games. In 1934, the Headers began a four-year home and home series with Edison High of Miami. In 1935, they played before 12,000 people at Thompson Stadium in New York City against Curtis High of New York, a much-publicized game broadcast over 19 radio stations.

The same year the team received an invitation to play in the Grapefruit Bowl tourney in Jacksonville on New Year's Day. They celebrated Christmas at sea that year aboard the S.S. Cherokee. And in 1936, Marblehead traveled to Port Arthur, Texas, for a post-season game. From 1934 through 1937, Marblehead football teams logged more than 13,000 miles.

McGuinness now lives in retirement in Prosser, Washington. In his nine-year stay at Marblehead, he gave fans of that town and thousands of other fans some of the most interesting football ever seen at a high school.

 Marblehead High using its first, second and third string teams sailed into an inferior Saugus High eleven at Joel Reynolds Field, yesterday leaving them breathless by a score of 33-2. Although the Headers did not get underway in the first stanza of the game, they were down of this resistance to such an extent that every touchdown, thereat practically a "One! Two! Three!" and the ball is over."

This procedure was hardly interrupted when Coach Charlie McGuinness' second stringer went on to the field after a comfortable lead had been set. Even the famous "lightweights," who but for their lack of poundage might see more fight on the gridiron for Marblehead, knocked the then tired Saugus lads around with little ease.

But for a muddy field that hampered both elevens the score might have been piled sky-high as the local lads found little trouble clicking off their plays in perfect rhythm and the opponents stood in amazement or were held by line that just wouldn't give.

FIRST SCORE

The first tally of the game came in the second period after an exchange of punts. Receiving the ball on their own 43 yard line they marched like General Sherman himself for four first downs and the goal; Messenger taking the pigskin over.

The second score might have been made in the same fashion, had not Lindsey "Lucy" Brackett (defending his nickname which is really "Loosey") broke loose on the 18th yard line. Only Pendleton remained in his path and with a final burst of speed "Loosey" easily out-ran him to cross the line unmolested.

The third touchdown of the game came in the second half with the One, Two Three play. One play, allowing Dick Messenger to run off 25 yards, a second play permitting Wells to add another score of yards and then the third play, Messenger going over.

The fourth score was the sensational play of the game with Messenger, Dick Wells, and Brackett scoring 25, 25 and 18 yards, respectively. Brackett probably had every man on the Saugus team dragging on him at one time or another, as they found themselves in his way and weakly tried to tackle him. He shook them off with the ability of a Zeland shimmy dancer, crossing the goal line alone.

Just before the 5th and final score of the game, the second team had been playing and although holding their own they were having trouble getting the offensive to function. The first team marched back on the field, picked up the ball and marched right down from the 30 yard line, Glover going over.

The lonely two points, obtained by the Saugus boys came only because Charlie Drennan showed good judgement with a wet and slippery field in front of him. A bad pass from Day made the ball hard to get for Charlie Drennan and he missed it. It rolled down near the one yard strip and J

nan recovered. Faced with eleven Saugus men that were upon him and a wet field, he slid over the goal line giving them a safety. was better than chancing a kick although he and Cudihy had been getting a few nice boots down the field.

TECHNICALITY

From a technical standpoint Marblehead scored 17 first downs against 4 for their opponent completed one pass for a yard of 18 yards out of three throws Saugus tried eight and completed four, netting 41 yards in all.

Plenty of penalties were available for both as the line slid aside, during anxious moments for a quick take-off.

KICKING FEATURE

Another feature of the game was the fine kicking of Ed Phelan. This young man who can almost promise Coach Charlie McGuinness when he walks on to the field that he will kick a goal, had bad day, yet a good one.

It was unlucky inasmuch as he missed his first attempted goal kick this year. Almost as if he was showing his sorrow, he placed the second attempted boot, right between the posts in beautiful style. He also got away to some beautiful kick-offs although he had little to do with the punting honors thereafter. Cudihy and Drennan sharing this job. Phelan however got one 48 yard kick on the kick-off that won a good hand from the crowd.

Glover made an end run for an extra point, Wells rushed a second through center and Phelan kicked the third for the only three extra points of the whole fracas.



Marblehead Vs. Newburyport at Reynolds Field

Newburyporters to be Entertained Here Tomorrow; Yachtsmen Took Licking at Hands of Lynn Classical Last Week, 20-7

The Marblehead High School gridsters have a tough assignment prepared for them tomorrow afternoon at Green street playground when they will stack up against the strong Newburyport eleven and will have to dig their cleats in hard to keep the lads from the Merrimac from flowing over them.

During the past week, McGuinness has been drilling his red shirted brigade in an effort to give them an adequate defense against an aerial attack. It has been clearly demonstrated in previous game this year that the Yachtsmen were far from being impregnable to a forward passing assault but this is being gradually ironed out.

The local boys have several deceptive line plays which should gain plenty of yardage for them and also may take to the air if chance presents itself. The Newburyporters are reputed to have an excellent team this season and the McGuinness men will have to dig deep into their bag of tricks to be on the heavy end of the score.

Last week they took a bad trimming from Classical despite the fact that they led 7 to 6 during the first half of the brawl. During the last two periods, however, Classical got up a full head of steam and rolled over the Yachtsmen in a green tide, the final count being 20

The local boys did well to smother Classical's much vaunted aerial attack although one of the touchdowns was made with a forward pass from a lateral. The rest of the scoring was done by means of straight line plays, the Headers learning that there were other teams who were as good at line work as they.

Classical scored the first touchdown after McGovern had recovered Messinger's fumble on the 'Head 20 yard line. Bennie Collier made a first down off his own right tackle and Bouverini hit the line twice, the second attempt landing him over the goal.

Marblehead scored after an exchange of punts and they had secured the ball on their own 35 yard stripe. Starting an attack which had the Classical lads in a daze, the Red Shirts swept down the field in a furious attack which did not falter until Messinger plowed through for the touchdown. Phelan and his educated toe were sent into the game and sent the oval spinning between the goal posts for the extra point from placement.

The spurt seemed to be their swan song, however, for Classical came back strong in the third period and the Lynn outfit took the ball on the Marblehead 40 yard line and Bouverini, Ferrini and Collier toted the ball to the 15 yard stripe. On the next play Bouverini flipped a lateral to Collier who in turn bulleted it straight into the hands of Ferrini in the Marblehead end zone for the score. Bouverini dropped-kicked the point.

In the last period Classical broke away again after taking a punt in midfield and Collier ran it down the field to the 35 yard line. Marblehead drew a fifteen yard penalty

Collier and Hayden alternated to gain a first down on the 3 yard line. Bouverini smashed through Marblehead's weakening line for a touchdown and pulled a "Charlie Brickley" for the extra point.

work. It is also to be remembered that McGettrick is a football player by inheritance as well as disposition and is dangerous at any time. There are some good men in the line and Captain Chaisson is an excellent defensive center as was proved last season. Logan and Houghton, the tackles, weighing 168 and 170, respectively, are no pushovers and are also towers of strength on the defense.

On our own team we also have plenty of talent. Every fan has come to know our fast and light backfield and their method of playing. Messinger at fullback has speed and has been picking up knowledge all during the year and is well rested up. Glover is a veteran and may always be depended on for a few yards when they are badly needed. Brackett, the ace of the ball toters with his weaving, twisting, Gyp Battles stride, will be a hard man for the Sculpins to stop. If Wells is in the game, so much the better. If he isn't, Iggy Drennan is bound to fill the berth

ably. He is wise to all the tricks and should make a good field general besides being a good ball carrier. Despite the fact that he is the lightest man on the team, he is a marvel when it comes to line plunging. With Hawkes and Carey running interference in the way they did in the Saugus game, the backfield should be hard to stop.

Lennox has been playing a fine game at end and Roundy at center. Johnny Cudihy takes care of his end well and has improved in his punting with every game. Stone is dependable and the veteran Web Goodwin has been taking care of his assignments in great shape.

McGuinness also has an ace in the hole in the person of Phelan, whose kicking has been exceptional and who may be needed for point kicking if the game is close.

Historic Clash Between Marblehead and Swampscott Marks 25th Contest

Silver Anniversary Duel for Grid Supremacy at 'Head on Holiday Expected to Draw 8000; Yachtsmen Favorites by Two Touchdowns.

MARBLEHEAD and Swampscott, the closest traditional football rivals along the north shore, will meet at Joel Reynolds playground, Marblehead, in the 25th encounter of a series which started in 1909. Thanksgiving morning. It speaks well of the sportsmanship taught at the rival schools, this unbroken continuation of friendly emulation which has not been marred over a quarter of a century. The game is a miniature Harvard and Yale contest, with all the color and enthusiasm that has afforded thousands pleasurable entertainments since the schools started hostilities. The 'Headers are favored to win by two touchdowns.

The game has aroused greater interest among the many followers than any of former years, because of the season's records of the combatants, and indications point to a gathering of some 8000 watching the tussle, which opens at 10 o'clock. It is expected the battle will not only draw the fans from Swampscott and Marblehead, but that some followers of the sport from Greater Salem will be more interested in the clash than in the entertainment provided at the Witch City.

GAME IS SILVER GIFT TO WINNERS

Thursday will mark the silver anniversary of the big classic and while the Swampscott lads are planning to present the game to Coach John McLaughlin, the 'Headers are just as determined that Coach Charles McGuinness will celebrate the day in a fitting manner. The 'Headers are leading their old rivals by two games, 11 wins for the Red and Black, nine for the Blue, while four of the classics have been deadlocked. The game will be the fourth meeting between Coaches McGuinness and McLaughlin, with the Marblehead mentor having preserved a clean slate of wins.

Marblehead High eleven this year is recognized as a high powered scoring machine. Defensively weak, the Red and Black team has a deceptive running attack, an offensive that puzzled Lynn Classical and the Tannery Towners, until the second half of the game. Although defeated by the 'Tanners, Classical and Peabody the Red and Black has never been routed, always returning in the final canto to cause its opponents uneasiness until the final whistle.

Even with the loss of Wells the Marbleheaders are entering the fray. Favorites, Saugus was the last common opponent played, the 'Headers defeating the Rich-coached crew, 33 to 2 in a sea of mud, the week before Swampscott pulled a 6 to 2 victory from the grasp of the Saugonians.

The fans that know football are sure that John McLaughlin will have a fighting eleven in there Thursday morning. Coach McGuinness and his Marblehead crew are not taking into consideration any comparative scores. The blue-jerseyed warriors have always been a great defensive team, and McLaughlin has not wasted any effort to mould his club in the interval before the great duel.

SIX 1932 VETERANS

Swampscott is entering the fray with a well-seasoned team comprising six players who saw service in the 1932 combat and with plenty of reserve material. Captain Chailson, who played center last year, is attending to the pivot berth and has displayed ability through the season. Gondolfo, guard on last year's blue combination, will team with Kehoe in attending to the guard berths and both are fine sturdy lads, fast and fine intererfers.

Logan and Houghton are the tackles. They will have plenty of work cut out for them, when pitted against Stone and Hawkes. Hawkes is the fastest man on the Marblehead team, a fine blocker, and able to take punishment. Peter Stone, veteran of two years' standing, is also a hard lad to check. McGuinness plays these boys at end on the defensive, and very few plays have been ground gainers around the wings.

Swampscott should have a big edge on the flanks. Cudahy and Lemox are entering their initial Turkey day struggle. Ciardi is a seasoned veteran and knows all the tricks, while Maitland has progressed in the last few contests. Sam Fallon will be held in reserve by Coach McLaughlin, but will be assured of entering the struggle when the Sculpin resort to the over-head game. Teamed with his brother, Bill, these lads form a dangerous passing combination.

'HEAD GENERALS ALL HONOR STUDENTS

McGuinness believes in picking his field generals from honor students. Dick Wells, who called the turn in the huddles until sustaining a fractured olecranon, has been on the honor roll for the past two years. McGuinness has selected Pete Stone, a tackle, to direct the destinies of his club, while "Iggy" Drennan will replace Wells at quarterback. Like his predecessor, Stone has won academic fame at the school and is on the honor roll.

SWAMPSCOTT PASSING ACE MAY NOT PLAY

Whether or not Shirley Moulton, the Sculpin passing ace will be able to don a uniform is a question, McLaughlin declaring a leg injury had handicapped the lad all the season.

Moulton was a constant threat to the Red and Black last season, but will be well hobbled by the Marblehead aerial defense if he enters the fray. Di Pietro is the main cog in the Sculpin's offense. His fine work and his aggressiveness displayed this year has stamped him outstanding. He is leading his team in points, and with Bill Fallon, whose passing and strategy has proved of great value to the team, will doubtless carry the main burden.

McGettrick and Moretti are both speedy backs. Moretti playing as safety man is speedy and shifty on his feet, a deadly tackler, and much will depend on the lad in the encounter. McGettrick is dependable. Although Stone may not start for the Sculpins, this boy is sure to make his entrance shortly after the game is underway. He has plenty of scoring power and is a hard man to stop when once shaken loose from the secondaries.

REPLACEMENT MATERIAL HAS BEEN SEASONED

In the replacement line McLaughlin has available plenty of reserve material which has been tested in actual combat. Griffin, a 160-pound tackle, and Manchin, a guard, are able to carry on at a moment's notice. Ludlam, a back, with Coughlin and Moore are considered first string material. In fact Swampscott has a wealth of replacement material which have had plenty of experience.

Although the 'Header's are not entering the fray at full strength owing to the loss of Wells and the absence of Walter Lader, a second-string back of great promise, who has run into classroom difficulties, McGuinness has collected the strongest team since taking over the reins at the Red and Black institution.

A strong capable line, which has been developed into the best combination of blockers seen in a Red and Black uniform, is mainly responsible for the great showing of the Marblehead backs. Webster Goodwin, playing his final game for the 'Head institution, is one of the stalwarts of the line. His play this season has stamped him as one of the most valuable

DRENNAN FILLING SHOES OF WELLS

Drennan who is filling the berth of Wells is another player of value. Tipping the scales at 135 pounds, Drennan is a great blocking back, and can also be used on power plays but in this respect he is not as valuable as Wells. With Ed Cudihy, he will share the punting assignment. Dick Messenger, sophomore, full-back can kick, pass and run the ball. Playing in eight games he has rolled up 38 points. With the exception of Winslow Hawkes, Mitto Glover, halfback, is the fastest man on the team.

McGuinness has a wealth of reserve material. Ed Pleian has failed only once this year in converting an extra point, and his educated toe can be depended upon if the contest is close. In the backfield Martin, Loveday, Hazell and Gagnon, can assume the mantle of any ball totter that falls by the wayside. Monahan and Jermyan can carry on in the line.

With two elevens such as Marblehead and Swampscott High football teams both eager to win the Turkey Day clash and that same old gridiron spirit prevailing between the two schools, it might be dangerous for the writer to predict a victory for either side unless he was using a nom de plume and could hide himself until after the Thanksgiving game was over, but nevertheless I'm forced to say Marblehead has got the edge.

REAL DOPE OF GAME

Now to get down to the fine points of just how the teams line up, perhaps you'll get a different idea of your own. There have been various opinions given as to the weight of the teams, but a review of the real statistics reveal that Swampscott's entire team outweighs Marblehead only six pounds which puts the two teams on a pretty even basis.

Swampscott has four men that stand more than six feet in their stocking-feet, while Marblehead has three. Then Swampscott has three men that are nearly six feet (5 ft. 1 in.), whereas Marblehead has four. To sum the situation up the two teams are on an "even-Stephen" basis as far as height and weight. This should dispense with those orientable excuses so often given by the fans of the defeated team, who complain because the opponents are bigger.

TWO VETERANS OUT

Some worry has been expressed by the Sculpins over the loss of Ciardi as he is not likely to play, but then Marblehead has got its worries along the same line, for Wells, the regular pilot for the Headers, is not expected to be in the line-up because of injury.

Captain "Dick" Wells is a valuable man and his loss may be keenly felt, but to offset this disadvantage, Drennan will fill Wells' boots and unless he has a decided off-day the fans will see a good substitute in there. He can kick, pass and hit the line with the same ability as the best of them. His all-around ability fits him for the job of piloting and although a bit light in comparison this will be an asset when it comes to wiggling in and out of tough spots.

CLASSICAL TITLE

You can't forget, however, the way Marblehead shaped up against Lynn Classical, although finally defeated 20 to 7. The start of the game just goes to show how Marblehead would travel and go places if they had the student body of other bigger schools do, whom they play against.

Remember that memorable few minutes, when after Classical had scored a 6 point lead on a lucky fumble recovery, Marblehead marched down the field in a series of end plays that were mystifying. 80 yards they marched. It was a march, too. Classical stood like dummies trying to figure it all out, wondering if perhaps they had got mixed up with some college eleven. The 80-yard march made a touchdown and then they added an extra point, giving Marblehead a one-point lead.

It looked bad for a few minutes, but then the reserves of Classical fired out the Headers and without a second string as good as their first, Marblehead finally petered out, losing 20-7.

'HEAD BACKFIELD

Good old Dick Messenger is well rested and will be rearing to go at fullback. Then, too, Glover, who can always be depended on for a few yards when they are badly needed, is in fine shape. Ibbey Drennan knows all the tricks which Coach "Charlie" taught Wells and he should be a bone of contention.

Hawkes and Carey have the faculty of setting away from their man and lead a running, blocking attack down the field for the backfield, while Lennox and Cudithy, as well as Roundy, hold down that line for a fare the well.

Charlie McGuinness, it will be remembered, if it comes right down to single points, has got a real ace in the hole in Eddie Phelan. If it is a question of one point, Eddie will cleave that ridge-pole of the goal posts with the accuracy of a champion marksman. He can kick like nobody's business and if he doesn't do anything else for Marblehead he has earned his salt this year with his timely goals.

With Ciardi out of the line (this is not definite) some worry may be taken from the hosts' shoulders, for it was Ciardi that did the ball carrying and gave the Headers considerable worry in the turkey fracas of 1932.

If Ciardi is out, Coach McLaughlin has an assortment of capable ends to fill in with, all of whom have had experience during the past season. Buffalino and Spinney, or possibly Cahoon or Sprague may also get a share in the game, before the final whistle is sounded.

AERIAL ATTACK

The McGuinness boys have got to play heads up football, too, for unless they do, the Fallon brothers of Sam and Bill, are apt to sneak over one of those famous passes which help to pile up the scores, which the Sculpins have chalked on their victory slate.

Dipietro is another worry for the Headers. He will help in the effort to wear down the Marblehead line and get in some heavy bucking. McGettrick, it is also recalled, is a football player by inheritance and together with Logan and Captain Chaisson will put up a strong defense.

It is understood, of course, that the season's record does not always govern the outcome of the Thanksgiving Day game, for when two such teams as Swampscott and Marblehead are matched up with plenty of rivalry spirit existing between them, anything can happen.

When the Swampscott lads get off the bus after a nice chilly ride over to Joel Reynolds field, they are apt to start working up an appetite for the gobbler awaiting at home. It would be a terrible blow to Marblehead if the tables were turned after so much confidence has been noted among the football fans of the town.

Marblehead Has Battle To Whip Stubborn Swampscott Team 13-6

All Three Touchdowns of Games Climax by Sensational Pirages; Headers Spinners and Reverse Plays Big Factors in Victory; 5000 Watch Classic.

STONE SHINES IN OFFENSE OF BLUE TEAM

After an exchange of kicks between Fallon and Cudihy the half ended with the ball in midfield in Marblehead's possession.

William Stone, who had pulled Swampscott out of a bad hold before the half ended, was the big factor in the only count made by the blue team. Fallon forward which travelled 12 yards. Swampscott's assault was marshalled on Marblehead's 40-yard line, where Carey dropped Moretti.

The stocky blue clad fullback bucked the ball for a first down, on three tries. Fallon then slipped a forward to his brother on Marblehead's 10-yard line. Stone was again hurried against the Marblehead stalwarts but the frontier held like a wall. Quarterback Fallon then crossed the opposition. Di Pietro made a sweeping end skirt and although hit by at least five Marblehead players threw himself across the final line. Stones' attempted nullification of the point by rush was punished.

TOUCHDOWN PARADE OR 'HEAD VICTORY.

Marblehead's final touchdown procession, which was inaugurated on the enemy 45-yard stripe, saw a tooth-running offensive which was at time in the game the 'head forwards carried out their proper assignments and furnished protection for the ball carrier.

'Mitto' Glover came into his own as a stellar ball player, netting gains of eight and ten yards at a crack, outrunning the fine secondary defence erected by the McLaughlin men. Messenger shared Glover's burden in totting the ball on the long turnover. Glover broke away for an eight-yard gain on a spinner through the line to hand the ball on the enemy 10-yard marker. For a first down, Messenger was able to pick up only two yards on two tries and on the third down Brackett skirted his left side for the final touchdown. Glover swept around right end to convert, a point.

IDEAL SETTING FOR OLD SERIES BETWEEN ELEVEN SWAMPSCOTT SMOTHERS OFFENSE OF 'HEADERS

The Red and black attack smothered in the second period. The headers resorted to no aerial sorties to break up the defense, while the enemy had a nice variety of overhead plays, which Bill Fall, Swampscott quarterback, used to open up the Marblehead defense.

Receiving the opening kickoff, the visitors showed smart football. Di Pietro, who received, tossing a backward pass to Moretti, which gleaned 20 yards. A nice tackle by Glover pulled down the fast flying Sculpin.

Late in the second period of play Swampscott received a break, taking possession of the ball on Marblehead's 38-yard stripe after Brackett's futile had been seized by Glover. Unable to advance the ball through a running attack, Bill Fallon faded back on fourth down and pegged perfectly to DiPietro in the end zone.

The rangy halfback juggled the ball for a second, lost possession and Clardi grabbed the oval, to cross the line. Following the incomplete pass

Marblehead swung into action in the first period, taking the ball on the opposition's 25-yard mark, after an exchange of kicks. Messenger and Drennan bucked the ball into scoring position, resorting to straight line plunging until the oval was landed on Swampscott's five-yard stripe.

Here the elusive Lucy Brackett was given an opportunity, but Clardi, who slashed across the line during the entire tilt, smeared the play. Glover, behind some nice interference, made an end sweep over the zero marker for the count on the next play. Clardi blocked Puelan's attempted conversion.

LINESMEN AID BACKS BY CLEANING OUT.

While Glover was the keyman of the attack, doing his work well, yet he did it no better than his mates the linesmen, who moved the opposition out of the way, opening gaping holes when desired, the blockers who moved down the would-be tacklers, and the other backs who carried, as

strategy demanded. Iggy Drennan, Bill Brackett and Dick Messenger, in Swampscott, Marblehead defeated an eleven which possessed a stronger and more vital attack, with a defense which could keep the Red and Black from rushing the ball into touchdown territory. The Sculpins had a machine which was equal to the Yachtsmen and in two periods clearly outplayed the visitors.

A perfect defence against Lindsey Brackett had been mapped out by the opposition, and in this fast streaking ball carrier had little opportunity to start in his tracks. Clardi, during the first half knifed in fast to grab Lucy and when Drennan played back to protect the ball carrier, Gondolfo hit him from the other side.

FORWARD PASSING IS TABOOED BY HEADERS.

Marblehead did not essay a pass during the engagement while the visitors resorted to the air several times when yardage was needed and gained the necessary ground. Swampscott appeared to have Marblehead's offense diagnosed and no long trips were taken into enemy territory. The longest jaunt was turned in by Bill Fallon, who pulled his opponents inside on a fake pass, and then cantered 15 yards for a gain.

Although Cudihy got away some beautiful kicks he was shaded by his opponent Fallon. Messenger and Glover were the offensive stars for the winners. When carrying the ball they kept their feet following interference or finding holes. Quarterback Drennan handled the team cleverly, and selected plays with good judgment.

The Sculpins uncovered players, who from an individual standpoint, held their own with Red and Black stars. Captain Chaisson, was a lower of strength. Clardi and Logan also played splendidly; both these men frequently penetrating the crimson jerseyed backfield and stopping rushes or going down the field under punts.

FALLON'S PASSING RAGED, HURRIED BY THE ENEMY.

Fallon's passing was at times ragged but he was hurried by the charging of his opponents. In the third quarter Bill Stone and Coughlin, showed remarkable ability in line plunging, frequently carrying several yards before they were swept off their feet.

De Pietro playing his last game for the Blue was a whirlwind on the defense and in addition to making the only score for the vanquished, accumulated yardage during the duel. Logan made a gallant fight smearing up the attack of his opponents.

Both coaches rewarded the lads who have given workouts to the regular elevens the past season, a steady procession of reserves trotting from the bench to the field in the final minutes of play. Gardner Goldsmith, who gave great promise of developing into a flank man until he sustained a broken leg against North Quincy hobbled on to the field to win an "M." Captain Dick Walls, quarterback of the Marblehead team, shelved in the Saugus game with a broken elbow, cheered on his mates from the bench.
