

Headers Sneak Winthrop Win

Last Minute Pass Brings Lone Tally

Capitalizing on a strong wind for Capitalizing on a strong wind for their lone invasion of deep Win-throp territory, the Headers of Marblehead High soared to a final-minute 6-0 victory before 3000 at Miller Field, Winthrop, yesterday, in the initial gridiron meeting be-tween these North Shore rivals since 1933. since 1933.

In business-like fashion, the Headers responded to Dame Op-portunity's first knock in the game's fading moments, scoring on a 12-yard aerial from halfback Johnny Larkin to end Hank Chrow-towski to upset the heavier Winthrop eleven that couldn't take advantage of its numerous scoring chances.

With its flashy scat-back, Milton "Bomber" Neal, consistently tearing off good yardage but failing to get down-field blocking, the home forces drove 45 yards to a firstdown at the Marblehead nine, midway through the opening stanza before bogging down and losing the ball on downs one-yard away from the end zone.

Winthrop had another golden opportunity taking Marblehead's kickout at the visitors' 29, but a firstdown running play lost 10 yards, and the Headers finally took over at the 25. Again in the third period, with a favoring wind. Winthrop drove from midfield to the Marblehead 24, but here a holding penalty nullified the advance.

A 60-yard wind-carried punt by

Larkin set the stage for the final-period winning touchdown. Win-throp's return kick, after three futile line plays, traveled only 14 yards to the Winthrop 46. A 23yard pass successfully operated by the touchdown combination of Larkin and Chrowtowski clicked to the 26, but a pass interception momentarily stopped the advance at the 18.

Facing the prospect of a short wind-swept punt, or on the other a possible first-down just two yards away, Winthrop gambled and lost. Marblehead gaining possession of the ball at the 27. With the seconds ticking away, Larkin first passed to halfback Charlie Gross for a first to halfback Charlie Cross for a first down at the 14. Then Larkin un-corked a perfect strike to Chrow-towski who took the ball on the two, spun away from a would-be tackler, and went into touchdown territory standing up.

Three plays later, the ball game was over, and the Headers, in their second game of the season, had presented new coach Dave Morsey, former Bates College mentor, with

Making his Sarah Bernhardt in High school bootball, Charles "Nick" Papoulious, who enters the Armed Forces next week, ran roughshod over Marblehead to give Amesbury a 12 to 0 win in a Northeastern Conference loop contest Saturday on Landers field.

Judging from his final performance, Nick, who made a 55-yard ounting canter in the final frame in addition to scoring in the second period, after the Carriage Towners had made a sustained march from their 40, should be particularly effective in a Tank battalion.

Papoulious was given excellent blocking which erased Marblehead's first and secondary defenses, and was ably abetted by Klien, a giant tackle, and 148-pound John Roberts, scat back who showed bursts of speed worthy of Marblehead's mighty little atom, Stace Clark, in his prime.

The Tassinari team, combined a ground and air assault effectively finding Marblehead's right flank vulnerable. Boody's fumble on Marblehead's three-yard ribbon early in the third period gave the Moreymen a break just when the Carriage Town juggernaut was rolling smoothly for another count.

Edges Marblehead 15-14 in Thriller

MARBLEHEAD, Nov. 11-Scoring a touchdown in the third period, forcing a safety and registering the winning touchdown in the fourth period, Beverly High overcame a Marblehead 14 point advantage to win 15 to 14 in a thrilling battle on the Joel Reynolds gridiron, Marblehead today.

It was Bobby Robinson's forward passing and kicking aided by Joe MacDougall and Bob Debner, a couple of ball clutching wingmen. and the line bucking and ball carrying of Louis Sabu Mazzaglia, a 136 pound halfback, that combined in the second half of the game to

bring victory to Beverly.

PRINCE FALLS BACK INTO END ZONE

The Robinson to MacDougall air route for 31 yards in the third period accounted for the Garden City's first touchdown.. It was Robinson's pass to Debner that scored the conversion.

With the ball on the eight-yard line in the fourth period a Robinson pass was intercepted by Marblehead's Charlie Prince almost on the goal line and Prince fell back into the end zone for a safety and two

points for Beverly.

The winning Beverly score came with five minutes left to play. Rob-inson sent Mazzaglia and Frank Marchelli through the line for gains with Ralph Lewis finally going off his own right side for eight yards and the touchdown. Robinson's forward for the conversion was knocked down.
