FROM PENTUCKET TO FOXBORO

Magicians journey to a conference championship and Super Bowl finalist

GAME 1: ■ MARBLEHEAD 27 PENTUCKET 2

The Magicians trailed early as a result of a first quarter safety, but there was no need to panic in this game. They went on to score the next 27 points to win it going away.

Co-captain Evan Comeau led the way with three touchdowns, as well as a safety. On his second touchdown of the game, Comeau caught a pass on fourth-and-23 from quarterback Hayes Richardson, and utilizing brute strength to evade several would-be tacklers and his natural speed he made it across the goal line for six more points.

Coach Jim Rudloff was still talking about the play well after the game. He said: "It was the best play that I've seen in a long time. He showed brute force to evade the tackles, and then had a nice spin move around another defender to break free for the touchdown."

Richardson accounted for the fourth touchdown late in the game on a nine-yard run to paydirt.

Will Quigley was credited with a fourth quarter interception, and Nathan Koontz recovered a fumble to account for the defensive turnovers that thwarted Pentucket drives.

The Magicians enjoyed a rather comfortable 23-0 lead at halftime. Josh Freedland started this game in spectacular fashion with a blocked punt, and subsequent run to the end zone for a touchdown from 18 yards out.

Quigley scored a second quarter touchdown, negotiating the final five yards for six points. Marcell Hardmon came through with a 24-yard touchdown run. Comeau then accounted for his second safety in as many games for two more points. Mike Bernato had three extra points to add up the rest of the first half points.

Damarco Dooley was responsible for the lone second half touchdown with a 25-yard run to the goal line, and Bernato made his extra point boot count, once again. Dooley also picked off one pass.

"I was happy with a couple of good things from this game," coach Rudloff said. "We were able to stay healthy, and we did play better on special teams, and blocking for the running backs than what happened against Pentucket. It paid off with a 100 plus yard performance [Will Quigley: 13 carries for 144 yards, and one touchdown] and rushing touchdowns. We [the coaching staff] identified areas for them to work on in practice, and they responded well."

There was also the ever-present sadness about two members of the Marblehead High School community who should have been in the stands for this season's historic victories: the principal who was the tireless advocate for all students, athletes and non-athletes alike, and the sophomore who was tragically denied the opportunity to paint her face and shout encouragement alongside her classmates. No one would have dared assign the players the responsibility of uplifting the school and wider community, but they threw it onto their shoulder pads, anyway.

Theodore Roosevelt once wrote to but the sport did not master them. In his children that he was "delighted" that they played football.

"I believe in rough, manly sports," he wrote. "But I do not believe in them if they degenerate into the sole end of any one's existence. I don't want you to sacrifice standing well in your studies to any over-athleticism; and I need not tell you that character counts for a Marblehead Food Pantry's Thanksgreat deal more than either intellect or body in winning success in life. Athletic proficiency is a mighty good servant, and like so many other good servants, a mighty bad master."

GAME 3: Lynn Classical 28 Marblehead 15

The Magicians played the Division 1 Northeastern Conference Large foe on their home turf at Piper Field. But after the Rams scored the first two touchdowns of the game, the home team basically settled down nicely to play the visitors evenly throughout the rest of the game.

Matt Perlow was on the receiving end of a 26-yard scoring strike from Richardson. Richardson netted the conversion points with a run. Comeau then hauled in a 22-yard touchdown pass from the senior quarterback. It was one of his eight receptions that he made in this game for 119 yards. Richardson completed 22 passes for 255 yards.

GAME 4:

- MARBLEHEAD 42
- GEORGETOWN 0

The Magicians got back on the winning track with plenty to spare, while also avenging the loss to the Royals in 2008, 28-14. The locals were in command at halftime, 28-0.

Hardmon scampered 57-yards for six points to begin the rout. Flynn McCormack caught up with a 38yard touchdown pass from Richardson. The same tandem then hooked up for a 24-yard touchdown.

Richardson also had two short runs that accounted for touchdowns. Freedland came through with a defensive touchdown on an interception that he brought back 42 yards for six. Quigley also intercepted a pass that led to an offensive touchdown, while on offense he carried the ball nine times for 57 yards. Hardmon was the leading rusher for the locals with 75 yards on just four carries.

Richardson completed four passes

for 70 yards, and he also ran for 33 more on eight carries.

Perlow was the star of the show on defense with 2.5 sacks, one stripped fumble and one fumble recovery on a bad snap, not to mention three times in which he hurried the Georgetown quarterback into making premature passes.

Koontz and Comeau had fumble recoveries. Co-captain Matt Evans and Matt O'Neil were credited with six tackles apiece.

GAME 5: Marblehead 26 Revere 7

This game was more of a struggle. The Patriots were clinging to a 7-0 lead at halftime.

Hardmon (10 carries, 58 yards) got things untracked for the locals with a seven-yard touchdown run. Richardson (13 carries, 64 yards) then went over from the one for six more points. Quigley (10 carries, 69 yards) kept the momentum going in the right direction with a 17-yard run to the end zone.

"Revere is a very physical, big team, and their speed also gave us fits. But we went to the run in the second half that enabled us to win the game," said Rudloff after the game.

GAME 6: Marblehead 35 Salem 13

"Playing Salem was a good challenge, because they are in a higher division than us, so our kids had to step up," said Rudloff afterwards.

The Magicians stepped up on the strength of Richardson's arm, whose 25- and 24-yard aerials to Perlow and Quigley, respectively resulted in touchdowns. Bernato's sure foot made it 14-0, before the Witches got SEE JOURNEY, PAGE 13

We lost to a Winthrop team, who we felt like we should have beaten, bringing our record to 8-2 heading into the biggest game of our lives in a showdown at Piper Field.

This was our chance to finally get our revenge against rival Swampscott. This time, the game was in our house,

Through the summer, we slogged away in a newly renovated weight room (thank you to those who made that possible) and sessions at the Muscular Sports Therapy Center.

With the help of Paul, Luke and Dirty Dave, we flipped tractor tires and performed the Tennessee Titans rope workouts that were exhausting, yet paid off.

Then came the camps and scrimmages in the dog days of summer, which led to the highly anticipated season opener against Pentucket. They were ranked seventh in Division 2 at the time, which is a division above what we are and far ahead of what we were ranked at the time.

By the end of the game, not only did Evan single-handedly assert his dominance, score at will and have a Youtube video made of him, but the entire team made a statement that night to the league.

As the season progressed, we ran through our non-league schedule. Despite our winning, critics from other towns would not give us the respect we deserved.

Then came the second big game of the season against Beverly. This was a team that our new coach had come over from, and was quick to state that not only were they good, but they were fast, strong, three deep at every position and were hungry for a title.

Everybody came to play and every

fan seemed to be screaming wildly. As Beverly ran a simple run play to the left, disaster struck. Matt O'Neil, a 200-pound bull of a middle linebacker, stepped awkwardly after shedding a block and broke his leg. It was a significant loss as he had played beside me for my entire career, and he could always be counted on to get the job done.

It hurt to see him like that, and from that point on we were motivated to win the game for "Oniz."

Fast forward to the Winthrop game where Ben Koopman, our 260-pound left guard and defensive tackle, went down with a torn MCL and strained ACL. Suddenly, we were without 460 pounds of hardened football players. A big loss, but yet another testimony to the replacements who stepped up and performed admirably such as Broughton, Forman, Josh Freedland and Oliver Gregory.

I also want to point out the contributions of Nathan Koontz, who led the team in fumble recoveries, and is a great punter despite what he was told.

Now, it came down to the Thanksgiving Day football game against our archrivals from Swampscott, who were also contending for the Northeastern **Conference Small Division** championship. The game went back and forth, with us storming out to a big lead then squandering it away.

It came down to a fourth and one. Coach O'Connor called: "base up suicide snap zero," essentially calling an all-out blitz. Jose Andrade, our Vince Wilfork-like nose guard, and Blake Forman clogged the hole and almost half our defense seemed to make the tackle.

Before finally ending the game with a touchdown pass to Haigis, Hayes would say to us: "No matter what happens, I love every single one of you guys."

On to Rockland, with their highly touted combo of "Thunder," a 235pound man-child, and "Lightning," a kid clocked at 4.5 seconds in the 40.

Our defense stopped them, our offense moved the ball and Mike Bernato was perfect in the kicking game. From a player's standpoint, seeing what seemed to be most of Marblehead in the stands at Manning Field in Lynn was truly unbelievable.

The police and fire truck escort we received made us feel on top of the world. We felt invincible as we were all dancing on cloud nine that night.

Practice continued to be the same, as we felt a change in routine would be bad luck. The only thing that did happen to change was the music in the weight room.

As Thanksgiving was now behind us, Christmas music started to leak into the air. What team besides a bunch of kids from Marblehead, would listen to Jingle Bells while

lifting weights in preparation for the Division 3 Super Bowl?

The magnitude of our final game at Gillette Stadium was far beyond anything this group of players had ever played in. Bishop Feehan came in with a high scoring offense and punishing defense. When we met them in the practice bubble, where we warmed up before the game, they looked big, and I'm sure that they thought we looked small. But as the saying goes: "It's not the size of the dog in the fight, but rather the size of the fight in the dog," and boy, were we ready to fight.

By no means was this an offensive showcase. It was a defensive slugfest from the beginning.

Occasionally, we would take a look at the crowd and a quick glance at the replay on the Jumbotron.

Even though we fought hard, it was just not enough to pull it out. It was truly heartbreaking to see all of our hard work come down to the wire, when we had come so far and so close.

In hindsight, no team has ever been as "magical," as the 2009 Marblehead High School football team. I have never been so proud to be a part of anything as much as this team in my life. I have enjoyed playing with this group of seniors for almost 10 years. We have won; we have lost, yet we have always stuck together.

on the scoreboard in the third quarter. But Alex Haigis blocked the extra point attempt, and ran it back for two points.

Richardson added to the 16-6 lead with a 12-yard keeper to begin the fourth quarter, and then chipped in with a 10-yard touchdown run to close out the game for the offense. But Haigis wasn't through, when his theft on defense resulted in a 40-yard runback for the final Marblehead touchdown of the game.

GAME 7: Marblehead 34 Saugus 12

The Northeastern Conference Small Division schedule got under way with a convincing win over the Sachems.

Richardson initiated the offensive explosion with a 56-yard jaunt to the end zone, a precursor of what was to come against Swampscott on Thanksgiving.

Hardmon then scored from seven yards out. The Sachems made things interesting when they scored their second touchdown of the game to trim the deficit, 14-12. But the Richardson to McCormack combination extended the lead with a 10-yard scoring strike. The senior quarterback then used his legs to gallop 42 yards for another six points. He called his own number once again to account for a 17-yard touchdown run, ending the game with eight carries for 150 yards and three touchdowns.

The Magicians improved to 7-1 after this road win against another divisional opponent. The Falcons scored on the opening possession, but Richardson got it right back with a five-yard touchdown run. The Falcons, however, regained the lead in the second quarter, 14-7. But in this back and forth game, it was Marblehead's turn to score on a 12-yard scoring strike from Richardson to Haigis. Richardson then had one of his patented long scoring runs, this time from 54 yards out, after Danvers retook the lead. 20-14. A Bernato extra point was the difference on the scoreboard at halftime.

The third quarter was scoreless, and the Magicians knew they had to tack on a few more points for insurance purposes.

The defense got the next three scoring drives going with crucial turnovers. Haigis came up with an interception that led to a touchdown by Hardmon, and a couple of fumbles by Danvers led to two more scores.

Richardson collected 267 passing yards on 12 completions. Haigis was the leading recipient with four catches for 107 yards. Hardmon was the leading ground gainer with 71 yards on 16 carries, plus two touchdowns.

Comeau returned after recuperating from a sprained ankle, and led the defense with nine tackles. > SEE JOURNEY, PAGE 14

finally put this game out of reach for his teammates with three unanswered touchdowns. He ended up carrying the ball 19 times in the game for 151 yards.

Linebackers Comeau and O'Neil also helped make another win possible with nine and eight tackles, respectively. Ben Koopman and Perlow both had interceptions late in the game to thwart any notion of a Beverly comeback.

"It was a great game. The field was packed like a Thanksgiving game. There were students in the stands, who had painted themselves up. It was a really neat, wild atmosphere," Rudloff said.

GAME 10: WINTHROP 27 MARBLEHEAD 18

As it turned out, it was just one of those extra games that didn't mean that much in the schedule, but it was still a wake-up call for the Magicians that ultimately set the tone for Thanksgiving and beyond.

It was indeed one for the ages, with all of its playoff machinations hanging in the balance. Marblehead dominated the first half, but Swampscott came back in the second half to take a 27-26 lead. It only led to a drive that the hometown Marblehead fans will never forget, not to mention the first conference title in 36 years.

Here's the drive's breakdown:

After an incomplete pass, quarterback Hayes Richardson hooked up with Haigis, who made a sensational leaping 30-yard catch to the 36. But Richardson was just warming up. He found Hardmon dashing out of the backfield to snare a pass for 28 more yards to the Swampscott 34. It was then time for Haigis to account for an 18-yard reception to the 16, and after Marblehead was caught offsides Hardmon put his running shoes back on to pick up six yards to the 17. Richardson inched his teammates closer with a four-yard run to the 13 with 1:01 left in the game, and he wasted little time to secure the game-winning touchdown with a 13-yard scoring strike to Haigis.

Richardson, the co-offensive Player of the Year, completed 15 passes for 270 yards versus the Big Blue.

Rudloff, the NEC Coach of the Year, couldn't have been happier to help bring this championship back to Marblehead at long last.
